Winter Training For Scouts Dated

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 10. — The "go-ahead" sign for a Boy Scout winter training camp to be held at Santiam lodge during the Christmas vacation was given last week by the Oregon state council's camping and activities committee at a meeting in Eugene.

The camp will accommodate about 60 Boy Scouts, and junior leaders selected by their troops will attend. Training in leadership for troop winter activities, as well as winter sports, will be featured at the three-day camp scheduled for December 26, 27 and 28.

The camping committee which is also making plans for the development of the council summer camp, Camp Lucky Boy, decided further consideration of the building program outlined in the council's "Adventure Unlimited" plan would be postponed for about six months with the exception of facilities which are absolutely necessary for the operation of the camp. However, a special committee made up of Alton F. Baker, Clyde Quam and Dr. E. D. Furrer was appointed to work immediately with the council's executive staff in laying out a report showing needs and uses of the proposed camp buildings.

Dates for the 1946 Camp Lucky Boy season were set by the operating committee with a nine-week season scheduled including two two-week periods, four one-week periods, and a one-week senior expedition for scouts over 15 years of age. The camp will open on Sunday, June 23.

Endorsement was made by the committee of district camporees in the spring of 1946 in all seven districts which make up the Boy Scout council and a council-wide merit badge show for the fall of 1946.

Doe Slaughter of Little Effect on Herd Number

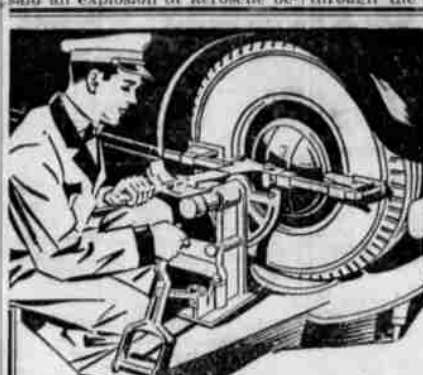
PORTLAND, Dec. 10. — The special season December 1-5 in the Fort Rock area netted Oregon hunters 582 does, with 590 sportsmen checking into the grounds, State Game Supervisor Frank B. Wire said here.

The slaughter seemed to have little effect on the number of lady deer cavorting around the region, he reported. Game commission biologists had reported 12,000 to 15,000 deer jamming the sector, many starving from lack of feed.

INKOM, Idaho, Dec. 10. — Two more children burned when fire destroyed the two-room Mont Martin home near here last week Saturday, increasing the fatalities to six. Only the 31-year-old father and one son, Sonny, 9, still survive.
