If you're wise, you'll keep an open mind on this Indonesian business. Like nearly everything else, it has two sides.

There is the natural resentment of industrially backward peoples against alien rule. On the other hand, it is reasonably probable that under Dutch management the masses of the people of Indonesia might be better off PHYSICALLY than they would be under their own not too advanced leaders.

But, as illustrating the generally MIXED state of human affairs, they'd probably rather be industrially backward, and INDEPENDENT.

People are odd that way.

THE world is full of doubt and suspicion.

We suspect the Russians. The Russians suspect us. India is clamoring to be free from Britain. The Indonesians are clamoring to be free from the Dutch.

In the reshuffle of ideologies, as well as boundaries, nobody feels secure.

HERE on our own home front doubt and suspicion are abroad.

Management fears labor. Labor fears management. The farmer is beginning to fear both.

There are minor irritants. There aren't houses enough to go around—and people without a place to live are edgy.

There are pent-up grievances against the injustices of war. And so on. One could continue the list indefinitely.

Over all hangs the menace of the atom bomb and the new world it is ushering in.

TOLERANCE is the great need of the world at the present moment.

MAINTAIN THE TURKEY SHOW

Importance of the Northwestern Turkey Show, concluding in Roseburg today, is most emphatically demonstrated in quality of birds exhibited for the past three days.

The average individual perhaps would be unable to detect any change. There has been no shading of savor in the golden brown bird fresh from the roasting oven.

Turkey show judges do not gaze upon birds centered upon a damask covered table and flanked by glittering china, scintillating glassware and highly polished silver.

The history of the broadbreast turkey is linked closely with that of the Northwestern Turkey Show.

Ward Cockeram, Oakland turkey grower, is considered the pioneer in development of the Broadbreast.

Cockeram was growing the Blackback Bronze turkey. He heard of the English Bronze, imported from England to Canada. The English bird had a knobby breast.

When, in 1931, Broadbreasts came into the Northwestern Turkey Show as entries in the dressed division, they immediately took all top prizes.

The Pacific Northwest leads the nation in turkey production with an industry amounting to well over \$50 million annually.

Strict attention is required to maintain constant breed lines. To prepare birds for show purposes, growers select the best of their flocks when the birds are five or six months of age.

From this year's show it is evident that competition and comparison are desirable and necessary adjuncts to improvement in the industry.

British Reinforce to Battle Indonesians

BATAVIA, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Fighting flared at several points in Central and Western Java today as British authorities brought fresh reinforcements into the strife-torn island despite an Indonesian threat that such action would be answered with a general uprising.

The British took over all main railway stations at Tandjong Priok and Batavia to facilitate local movement of supplies.

These developments came less than 24 hours after Premier Sjahrir of the unrecognized Indonesian republic said the Indonesians would resist with arms any further landings of British troops.
