POW Toil Saves U. S. Sizable Sum

FORT LEWIS, Dec. 14.—(AP)—More than \$200,000 has been realized by the U. S. government from the use of German prisoners of war at Fort Lewis in labor-short industries, and thousands of man-hours of work have been performed by the prisoners on the Post grounds, Maj. Frank N. Jacobs, commanding officer of the POW camp, has revealed.

As the agricultural season sized, the prisoners were assigned jobs on the post until now, practically all of them are used for functional duties here.

In all, every one of the current allotment of 4286 prisoners work every day with a resultant gain for the U. S. government, not only from man-hours performed but also in doing jobs which otherwise would be as-

signed to U. S. Soldiers and would prevent their discharge. He said that no prisoner is employed on any job for which there is civilian labor available.

In 1945 about 73,000,000 persons or 52 per cent belonged to 256 religious bodies in the United States.
