Pearl Harbor Fleet Size Known by Japanese

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MacArthur's staff with his conjecture on what happened, since the staff officer in charge of the documents on surveillance at Pearl Harbor had died and the documents had been destroyed. Tachibana did not make it clear whether the Japanese had broken one of the American codes, but he said that on Dec. 6 "the United States broadcast of the number of battleships, cruisers, destroyers and others entering (or anchored) in Pearl Harbor was overheard."

Information Collected—Tachibana said that the Japanese naval intelligence division had "a most difficult time" judging the habits, strength and security situations of the American fleet.

As a result of this, he said, the intelligence section for years compiled material by collecting bits of information obtained from naval officers at Washington from American newspapers, magazines and radio broadcasts, from passengers and crews of ships stopping at Honolulu and from foreign diplomatic establishments and commercial firms.

Auto Workers Union Rejects Ford's Offer

DETROIT, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A pay increase of 15 cents an hour was offered by the CIO's United Auto Workers by the Ford Motor Company today, and the union promptly rejected it.

The company combined its wage offer with a demand on the union for a "company security" arrangement, involving fines up to \$5,000 for "illegitimate strikes."

Richard T. Leonard, Ford director for the UAW-CIO, announced immediately after a reading of the company proposals that Ford's offer was "completely unacceptable to the union."

Officer Quits Jap Trial In "Fair Play" Spirit

YOKOHAMA, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A member of the U. S. Military Commission set up to try small-fry Japanese war criminal suspects withdrew today after the defense argued his ordeal in the Bataan death march might have left him prejudiced.

Col. John H. Ball of Williams-town, Pa., who survived that march of horror, stepped down in the interest of fair play shortly before the opening of the first trial of a Japanese in his homeland on war crimes charges.

The dubious distinction of being first defendant was given Tatsuta Tachibana or "Little Glass

Eye," who pleaded innocent.

The prosecution announced it would seek the death penalty for the former prison guard, charged with "brutally and atrociously" beating to death PFC Robert Gordon Teas with knotted ropes.

Tsuchiya is the first of some 400 Japanese underlings who will be brought to trial for war crimes.

Marked Coins Trap Pair Tapping Pay Telephones

PORTLAND, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The mystery of the coins that never came back from uncompleted phone calls at pay telephones here was solved today.

Detective J. H. Braly reported two men, Soon Bing Dong, 222, and Thomas Goon, 40, were arrested on charges of larceny after investigation by Pacific Telephone Company agents.

The two men had \$5.40 in nickels and other coins, including several marked coins planted by the Phone Company in hotel pay booths, Braly said. Police said the men plugged return coin slots with paper, then returned next day to loosen the paper and harvest the coins.

Yeggs Loot Store—PORTLAND, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Safe-crackers failed to open the strongbox inside the Bedell store safe here but made off with \$2,000 in petty cash, police were told.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Shapers of congressional Naval policy cast a dubious eye today at a Navy proposal to turn over excess American fighting ships to the Republic of China.

The proposal, advanced yesterday by Secretary of the Navy

Forrestal in a letter to Speaker Rayburn, caught Capitol Hill off guard.

"This looks like a move in the direction of using the Navy to play world politics," one congressman said privately. "Apparently we are to give away our surplus ships to strengthen the hand of Chiang Kai-Shek in his fight with the Communists."

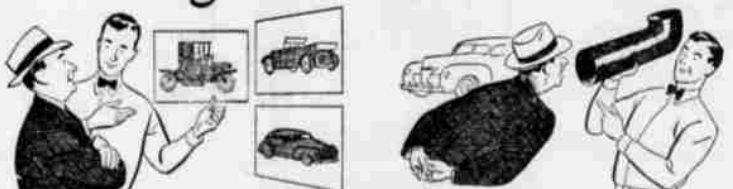
