PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 20.—(AP)—A wage settlement increasing the minimum to \$1.05 an hour and granting general 15 cent boosts at three Washington box factories was announced yesterday.

Georgian Heads Demand Return of Seized Lands

MOSCOW, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Leading Russian newspapers today published a letter from two Georgian Republic leaders who demanded that Turkey give up areas near the Turkish-Soviet frontier.

"We appeal to world opinion about the situation of our ancient land taken by Turkey," said the letter written by members of the Academy of Science of the Georgian Soviet Socialist Republic.

"We are not talking about some small territorial dispute," the writers continued. "This concerns the seized cradle of our people—a crime which has cut in two our living national body. The people must get back their land."

Fires Take Costly Toll in 5 Washington Cities

SEATTLE, Dec. 20.—(AP)—A wave of fires has caused at least \$235,000 damage to business properties in Washington state this week.

One of the most costly blazes was the \$80,000 fire in Mount Vernon yesterday, which swept through a half block of frame buildings and claimed one life.

Tacoma was hit by a \$30,000 blaze Tuesday, which almost completely destroyed the main plant of the Eagle Paper Box Co.

Two fires caused \$30,000 damage in Kelso Tuesday while Thompson's Beach Hotel at Conalia Beach burned the same day at a loss of \$35,000. The hotel was unoccupied.

Fire early last Sunday destroyed a general merchandising store at Belfair, near Bremerton, at a loss of \$40,000.

British Casualties in Java War Nearly 1,200

BATAVIA, Java, Dec. 20.—(AP)—British artillery pounded trouble spots in Northwestern Bandoeng for an hour today, as fighting which has already cost British and Indian troops almost 1,200 casualties continued in Indonesia. Meanwhile, a Netherlands navy communiqué announced the first naval action in the Java disturbances—the capture of what was described as a 60-ton motorship. The communiqué said the ship was seized Dec. 14 after she fired on a Dutch landing party from a destroyer.
