

## British King Fits Nicely Into New Political Scheme

LONDON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The advent of an out and out socialist government has rendered the position of the King-Emperor rather paradoxical in theory, although practically his majesty fits into the new political scheme of things as neatly as though the kingship were designed originally as part of England's leftist jigsaw puzzle.

The socialists haven't shown the slightest disposition to interfere with the monarchy. On the contrary, while thrones on the continent have been toppling in the leftist storm, the British institution still stands as solid as its own Rock of Gibraltar.

Considering all aspects of the situation, one is tempted to the belief that providence molded the character of the present king to fit the political crisis which has now hit England. He would seem in all respects to represent the type—and the only type—of monarch whom the socialist government could accept.

George VI is a plain man of the people. I've been watching him closely ever since he was a small lad, and so far as one can see he hasn't any ambition to exercise royal authority, or yet to wear a jewel-studded crown. He is quite happy to take his instructions from the prime minister. And that, of course, is precisely what the government in a constitutional monarchy—and especially a socialist government—most desires.

## Execution Awaits Nabbed Pekinese

Five o'clock tonight is the hour set for execution of a handsome, pure-bred Pekinese, which city police have held since Sunday afternoon for his owner.

The dog was picked up on Winchester street, near N. Jackson, by Police Officer Douglas J. Tudor. Under City Ordinance 1014, the dog's owners were advertised for two days. At 5 P. M., 48 hours after appearance of the second advertisement in the News-Review, the dog must be destroyed.

Many people have asked Tudor for the dog, but he cannot give him away. Only the dog's owners can have him. That's the law.

Since Tudor was appointed dog control officer for the city Dec. 3 by the city council, he has impounded 11 stray animals. Most of them were half-breeds, he said, with mixtures of spaniel, setter and terrier predominating.

Under the city ordinance, all dogs, whether strays or not, must be picked up if they are running loose in the city. Tudor has told several owners of dogs that they must tie up their pets, or face having them impounded if they wander off their home lots.

Tudor receives \$50 in addition to his regular salary to act as city dog catcher.

## Harbor Defenses of Columbia Will Remain

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The War Department has no plans at this time to abandon or dispose of the harbor defenses of the Columbia River in Oregon and Washington.

The department wrote Senator Guy Cordon that a report just received regarding the Columbia River harbor defenses "indicates there are no plans at the present time which contemplate the abandonment or disposal of those installations comprising the harbor defenses of the Columbia River."

Cordon also was notified that Camp White at Medford, Ore., was being reactivated and 2,300

troops were being sent there. He was told the camp would be retained permanently for training of between 2,000 and 3,000 men pending decision by Congress on the size of the postwar army.

## U. S. Sailors Battle Angry Brazilians

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Dec. 20.—(AP)—American sailors were ordered to remain aboard the U. S. cruiser Little Rock at Santos yesterday as police investigated clashes between some 350 seamen and angry Brazilians last night at Sao Paulo, 60 miles northwest of Santos.

Six Brazilians and several navy men were injured in the fighting, in which firemen brought fire hoses into play to hold back the crowds. Describing the beginning of the riot, dispatches from Sao Paulo said that some of the sailors ap-

parently had been drinking and began lifting the skirts of young women waiting in line for a bus. Angry Brazilians charged the sailors, the reports said.

## How to add an extra flourish to this year's Christmas Dinner

To stay the pangs of hunger generated by the aroma of roasting turkey serve the first course of your Christmas Dinner in the living room. Sparkling glasses filled with well chilled fruit or tomato juice appeal to the eye and palate. And crisp crackers and bread rounds, squares or triangles spread with cheese are the right accompaniment. Arrange these tidbits around a miniature Christmas tree placed in the center of a large plate or tray.

**CORNBREAD—RIPE OLIVE STUFFING**  
A delicious stuffing for the 12 to 15 pound Christmas turkey is made by using 6 to 8 cups crumbled cornbread in place of the ordinary bread in your favorite recipe. Besides the celery, onion, parsley, egg and seasonings, add 2 cups of chopped ripe olives.

**YAM CASSEROLE**  
To 6 cups cooked, peeled, mashed yams add melted butter, two beaten eggs, sugar and poultry spices to taste. Put in a greased casserole and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes to heat through. This dish does not require last minute attention.
