Pvt. R. C. Kiefer Returning To States for Discharge

FIFTH AIR FORCE, Korea — Pfc. Raymond C. Kiefer, 22, Roseburg, Ore., is returning to the United States for discharge, after trucking supplies for 19 months for the AAF in New Guinea, the Philippines and Okinawa and for its occupation force in Korea.

Pvt. Kiefer, son of L. K. Kiefer, who lives on Melrose Star Route, Roseburg, wears campaign stars for the Bismarck Archipelago, New Guinea, Luzon, the Southern Philippines, and the Ryukyus. He also holds the Philippines Liberation and Asiatic Pacific ribbons.

Kiefer attended Lookingglass High School and worked in Oregon logging camps before entering service in October, 1943. In Korea, he was assigned to the 308th Bomb Wing, Fifth Air Force occupation force.

Discharge of Vet Recorded Without Cost; Value Cited

In response to inquiries regarding the recording of veterans' discharge papers, Director Hugh E. Rosson of the Department of Veterans' Affairs explains that all counties in Oregon will perform this service without cost, as provided by state law.

Some confusion arose when the Navy began issuing a "notice of separation" on a separate sheet from the actual discharge certificate. But Attorney General Neuner, in an opinion handed down in November, ruled that this was an official part of the formal discharge and should be recorded, along with the discharge, without cost to the veteran.

On his return from the service the veteran should have his discharge recorded without delay in the office of the county clerk of his home county, Mr. Rosson emphasized.

This is important, he pointed out, because the veteran will then be able to procure photostatic or duplicate copies needed in applying for many types of employment, for state or federal educational and loan benefits, for pensions, and for compensation under the federal readjustment act.

Further, it will save the veteran the trouble and delay entailed in applying to the government for a duplicate in the event his original discharge papers become lost or stolen, Mr. Rosson explained.

Don't Sign OPA Papers, Oregon Grocers Advised

PORTLAND, Dec. 24. — (AP) — The Oregon Food Merchants Association today advised grocers throughout the state "not to sign any papers for OPA."

Signing papers for OPA checkers "immediately puts the proprietor behind the eight-ball," declared Secretary John M. Linsinger. He said signed compliance statements give the OPA evidence which "makes it difficult" for merchants to avoid paying penalties.

Linsinger suggested dealers audit their stores and make sure they are not violating ceiling prices.

Trio Jailed in Burglary Of Brownsville Store

ALBANY, Ore., Dec. 26. — (AP) — Three men are in jail here today charged with burglary, and \$21,300 in war bonds and cash taken

from a Brownsville store safe Friday night has been recovered, Sheriff Mike Southard reported. Jack Orville Mann, Corvallis, was arrested Saturday and implicated Roy Moore, 35, and S. D. McClain alias Douglas Day, 67, both Portland, the sheriff said. The latter two were arrested at

Portland. Sheriff Southard said that from a suitcase obtained at the time of the Portland arrest, \$20,000 in war bonds and \$1,300 in cash was recovered. The bonds represented the full amount missing, but approximately \$6,700 in cash had not been recovered.

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
