Mary E. Miller, Pioneer Resident Of Hayhurst, Dies

Mary Emma (Bridges) Miller, 89, well known resident of the Yoncalla community, died at her home Sunday night, following a long period of ill health. Born near Bloomfield, Missouri, December 3, 1856, she moved with her parents, Daniel and Eusebia Owen Bridges to California in 1859 and settled at Yoncalla in 1871. She was married April 6, 1873, at Yoncalla, to John T. Miller, who died May 4, 1927.

Mrs. Miller had resided for 71 years on the family ranch in Hayhurst valley. She was quite widely known for her writings published in newspapers and magazines. She was a member of the Yoncalla Church of Christ. She was the mother of six sons and daughters, of whom four survive: B. H. Miller, Yoncalla; Ida Montgomery, residing in California; J. M. Miller, Upper Marlborough, Md.; J. G. Miller, Charleston, W. Va. She also leaves three sisters, Mrs. Norman Smith, Portland; Mrs. James Davis, and Mrs. Walton Looney, Jefferson, Ore., and a brother, I. C. Bridges, Oregon City; 12 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

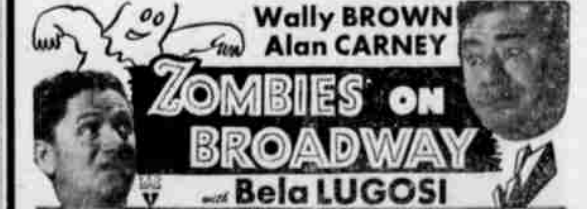
