## Oregon Between Joy, Despondency On Eve of 1946

Oregon celebrated its peacetime New Year yesterday with a year for the mounting number of jobs and a toast to promised industrial expansion.

The close of the victory year, which marked the decline of shipyards and industries, left the state teetering between delight and despondency.

Delight—for peace; sons and husbands coming home; the pledge of a place for Oregon in the peacetime sun; Despondency—for unemployment doubling each month since V-J day; a surging crime wave; an acute housing shortage.

But round the state new peacetime plants were going up, and businessmen predicted expanding industries as reconversion puts up full steam. Portland banks and savings and loan associations were checked with unprecedented deposits, and the city's real estate sales hit an all-time high at year's end.

The lumber industry, partially stymied by an AFL strike which began Sept. 24, expected to begin pouring out lumber for house-hungry Oregon civilians at full speed soon. Already, lumber had replaced shipbuilding as the state's biggest employer.

## Jap Mine Sinks Sweeper; Casualties "Moderate"

PEARL HARBOR, Jan. 2—(AP)

Toll of casualties aboard the minesweeper U.S.S. Minivet, which struck a mine Saturday off Kyushu Island, Japan, was unknown today as aircraft and surface ships searched for missing crewmen.

The initial announcement by Navy headquarters reported "moderate loss of life and injury" among the crew of nine officers and 82 enlisted men on the 220-foot vessel which was engaged in minesweeping operations in Tushima Strait, about 50 miles northwest of Kyushu.

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
