Pearl Harbor Raid Not Expected, Says Admiral Stark

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Admiral Harold R. Stark testified today that in December, 1941, the Navy did not expect either an attack on Pearl Harbor or any such broad-scale offensive as the Japanese launched.

The former chief of naval operations told a Senate-House Committee he would not have been surprised by the appearance of Japanese submarines off San Francisco, but he was "not expecting an air attack on Hawaii at that time."

Stark said the only tangible evidence the Navy Department had was that the Japs would launch their first attack somewhere in Southeast Asia, adding: "I did not expect an attack by the Japanese on any such broad scale as actually occurred, with the air strike at Hawaii and extensive offensives in the Southwest Pacific."

Nevertheless, Stark said it was his intention in a Nov. 27, 1941 "war warning" message to put all of the Pacific commanders on guard against attack. He said he meant the words "in any direction" in the message to convey the thought that the assault might come by air, sea or land.

Russians Outdo Selves in Feasts For Yankee Guests

BERLIN, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The Russians fed their pickles, candy, caviar and vodka for breakfast—but the three G's who accompanied United States correspondents on their first tour of the Russian occupation zone want to go back for more.

"We'll show those guys we can take it—even raw Siberian fish for breakfast," said Pfc. Jack Sorenson of Yakima, Wash. Sorenson and his mates—Pfc. Duane Read of Yantic, Conn., and Pfc. Charles Warm of Burlington, Ky.—chauffeured five correspondents and interpreters on an eight-day tour from Berlin to Dresden and return. For the G's it was a gastronomic and hilarious tour to remember.

The Russians, famed for their hospitality, outdid themselves. In Halle a commandant invited the correspondents and their drivers to "tea" at 4 P. M. after an interview. This "tea," in the town's largest hotel, turned out to be a five-course dinner served on a table groaning under a forest of glasses for vodka, champagne, red wine, brandy, cognac and beer.

Only the hardest survived the evening—and the three G's were ruggers. The next morning at breakfast they found two beer bottles and glasses of vodka, wine and liquor before each place. Also, each guest had a box of candies and a package of head-splitting Russian cigarettes.

Then there was the food. One end of the table was laden with pickles, two kinds of sausages, salami, herring, crabmeat, caviar, bread, rolls and butter. In the center of the table there were heaping baskets of fruits, cookies and nuts. Servants brought in veal cutlets, rice, fried chicken, potatoes, pork chops and fresh eggs.

And every few minutes someone proposed a toast to Russian-American friendship—for which the glasses had to be drained. The G's were game. On the return to Berlin they immediately volunteered for further "hazardous duty"—chauffeuring the next contingent of correspondents.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—A fire of undetermined origin destroyed the High School auditorium at the WRA center at Newell Monday afternoon.

The school plant was constructed at a cost of \$64,000. The school had been closed for some time. There were no occupants in the building and no records were housed in the auditorium.

In the early Christian Church the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered every day. The service was simple and was intended to be a re-enactment of the scene in the upper room, where the Lord ate the last supper with His disciples and bade them keep Him in remembrance through the two most commonplace acts of everyday life, eating and drinking. To this service each participant usually brought three things, bread, wine and a gift for the poor. One of the church fathers in his writings tells the story of a lady who smiled when he gave her the water in her hands, the consecrated bread, while he repeated the words of the Saviour "Take, eat, this is My body." Afterwards he asked reprovingly, "Why did you smile when I gave you the holy bread?" She replied with tears of joy in her eyes. "Oh, I was glad to have you give me the water that I had made with my own hands." We are happiest when the acts of everyday life are seen in a divine light and are thereby made sacred. Many miss the spiritual value of communion by staying away, and thus lose a blessing.—Upper Room.—Amen.

Navy B-Bottom Trousers Ousted By New Design

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The Navy Monday revealed details of its proposed new design for enlisted men's uniforms, replacing the jumper and bell-bottom trousers which have been the trademark of seafaring men for six centuries.

It cautiously explained, however, that the new design is still the subject of tests and if adopted, must await deletion of present stocks of old-style uniforms. Some 2500 "sample" uniforms have been distributed to the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and to shore stations for wearing and storage tests under all conditions, on the basis of which commanding officers will make criticisms and recommendations. The tests are expected to require about three months.

In the new design, conventional trousers replace the belted bell-bottoms, and the black neckerchief which tradition says was designed by the British as a sign of mourning for Lord Nelson will be replaced by black four-in-hand tie.

The body-tight jumper will give way to a jumper type shirt similar to a sport shirt, which can be worn open at the neck for "undress," or buttoned for dress.

A tailored, waist-length battle jacket is provided for dress or winter wear.

There are three separate uniforms in the new outfit—blue, grey and white—with shirts to match. The blue and white are dress uniforms, and the grey the working uniform. White trousers known to navy men as a "peu"

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coat," has been retained. The white uniform may be worn in both dress and undress fashion—with a black tie for dress and open at the neck for undress. The grey uniform is composed of grey shirt and trousers, similar to those now worn by chief petty officers. Headgear includes a blue earflap cap for the blue uniform, and the present white hat and a grey baseball-type cap to be worn with the white and grey uniforms, respectively. Currently authorized rating badges, hash marks and other insignia will be worn with the new uniforms. The present overcoat, may be worn with the blue battle

jacket in warm weather.
