

Session Pleases Oregon's Solons, Morse Excepted

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Oregon's Congressional delegation went into a new year today with satisfaction over one big 1945 accomplishment for the constituents: Approval of the eventual \$200,000,000 program for development of the Columbia and Snake rivers.

The Umatilla dam, the chief project in the program, had been urged for years by the state's congressional delegation. Its construction, plus that of four dams on Snake river, will provide a waterway from Idaho to the Pacific.

Byrnes Admits He Didn't Tell Mac Of Big 3 Plans

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes said Wednesday he went to Moscow with the impression that Gen. Douglas MacArthur believed the United States plan for allied control machinery in Japan was workable.

Byrnes told a news conference, however, that he had not kept MacArthur advised of developments on the subject during his conference with Foreign Commissar Molotov of Russia and Foreign Secretary of Britain.

Byrnes described as unauthorized by the State Department a statement made by Thomas D. Blake, press officer of the Far Eastern Commission, in response to inquiries Saturday, to the effect that MacArthur had not objected to the plan.

Blake, who is a State Department press officer as well as a statement made by Thomas D. Blake, press officer of the Far Eastern Commission, also said MacArthur had been kept informed of Moscow developments relating to Japan.

MacArthur said yesterday in Tokyo that Blake was wrong on both counts.

Byrnes told reporters that MacArthur was correct in saying he had not been advised of the Moscow discussions.

The secretary added that he never had expected to advise MacArthur, although he always had been concerned with preservation of the general administrative authority in Japan.

Byrnes said he firmly believed that objective had been achieved by the Moscow agreement.

He said the U. S. plans for the commission and council were submitted to the War Department in October and forwarded to MacArthur for consideration.

Byrnes said that MacArthur as supreme allied commander properly had no voice in making U. S. policy toward Japan, but instead was the administrator of that policy.

Byrnes emphasized, however, that he would not have proposed his plans for control machinery in Japan without first getting MacArthur's viewpoint.

Byrnes reiterated previous assertions that MacArthur had done a fine job at Tokyo and said he was delighted to learn of the general's determination to see how the new control plan works.

Byrnes added he only regretted that the statements which have been made have created the appearance of a conflict where none existed.

Pre-War School Courses of Japan Ordered Junked

TOKYO, Jan. 3.—(AP)—General MacArthur has ordered the suspension of three Japanese school courses utilized most effectively for spreading militaristic ultra-nationalism and the confiscation of all textbooks and teachers manuals used for them.

The order, which affects all schools in Japan, implemented recent abolition of state Shinto. It specified that Japanese history, geography and morals—roughly equivalent to American classes in ethics—will be suspended until headquarters approves their resumption.

Brig. Gen. Ken R. Dyke, head of MacArthur's Information and Education section, said these courses were so thoroughly loaded with nationalistic teachings that complete renovation is essential. He said the order was intended as "an implementation directive" providing details for previous, generalized renovation instructions.

The education ministry was instructed to prepare substitute courses and to submit plans for writing new textbooks covering the suspended subjects.

Confiscated textbooks will be destroyed. Pulp from them will be used for printing new books from which objectionable teachings will be eliminated.

The order also suspended the still effective wartime Japanese laws and regulations on methods of teaching these subjects.

The suspended course in morals heavily emphasized Shinto concepts of the emperor's divinity, Japan's "divine mission" and similar teachings upon which militarists depended for indoctrination.

Exodus of Jews Indicates Intent To Quit Europe

FRANKFURT, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Sir Frederick E. Morgan, chief of UNRRA operations in Germany, said today he believed thousands of Polish Jews pouring into the American occupation zone from the East were acting in accordance with "a well organized, positive plan to get out of Europe."

Morgan told newsmen he thought an unknown, secret Jewish organization was behind the infiltration. He said he was not convinced about what he described as "all the talk about pogroms within Poland."

"I believe we are about to see a second exodus of Jews—this time from Europe," the UNRRA executive declared.

(Lavy Bakstanski, general secretary of the Zionist Federation of Great Britain and Ireland, said he did not know of such an organization, but added: "I believe if Jews are leaving Europe, it is the result of intolerable persecution and slaughter such as no people have ever faced and rep-

resents the determination of European Jewry to terminate Jewish homelessness.")

Polish Jews are arriving by the trainloads from Lodz and other Polish centers, Morgan said, and they are "well dressed, well fed, rony checked and have plenty of money."

"They certainly don't look like persecuted people," Morgan declared. "I believe they have got a plan—a positive plan—to get out of Europe."

Morgan said he believed the Jews in Europe were "growing into a solid force" and that the entire Jewish plan was closely linked with the Palestine problem.

Court Rejects Appeal From Dehydrating Price

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The Supreme Court yesterday refused to review a decision which upheld an OPA order fixing \$110 per dried ton as the price for dehydrating in California apples of grade C quality or better.

Six Watsonville, Calif., firms asked review of the decision by the U. S. Emergency Court of Appeals. They contended the order was confiscatory and exceeded OPA powers.
