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new people are superior to other races and fated to rule the world." Military control has been imposed upon the government structure, but there has been minimum interference with the existing administration, the general wrote. He added: "Not only has this policy attained the desired ends, but it has avoided the use of hundreds of thousands of personnel which would have been required had the basic structure of the Japanese government been reconstructed and replaced."

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Democracy's Pace Slow

MacArthur's report held out no hope for an immediate trend to democracy in Japan because the people "have had no experience with it in any way" and the government has suggested little toward democratic reform.

But if democracy can't be imposed directly, the American GIs of the occupation force are demonstrating it, the general said. He added that the conduct of the troops is "exemplary."

The report, written well before the recent Moscow conference which resulted in an allied control plan for Japan, made no detailed comment on other allied powers in the occupation picture.

Korea Not Tranquil

It did comment, however, on the situation existing in Korea, where part of the peninsula is under Russian control, part under American.

"Since the two sectors of Korea are mutually dependent," said MacArthur, "all phases of life in the country suffer from the arbitrary division at the 38th parallel (the boundary between the two zones)."

"The solution to problems occasioned by this division can be solved only by active cooperation between the governments of the United States and the Soviet Union."

The Big Three foreign ministers at Moscow agreed on the formation of a joint United States-Russian commission to assist in the formation of a provisional Korean government.
