MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—The National Forest Service central repair shop for this region will be moved soon from Grants Pass to a large building here, formerly occupied by the Army Ordnance Department.

Two forest service employees, Clarence M. Tester and James Seeley, have been transferred from Grants Pass to Medford to prepare for the shop moving.

Knox' Report on Pearl Harbor Raid Revealed at Probe

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Congressional investigators heard yesterday that Hawaii's defenders fully expected the Japanese to come back promptly after the Pearl Harbor attack and called desperately for more fighter planes and anti-aircraft guns to meet the anticipated second assault.

This information went into the record along with the word that on that fatal Sunday morning, December 7, 1941, the Navy flew a 10-plane patrol in just the opposite direction from which the Japanese task force was advancing.

The source of these details was the hitherto secret report the late Secretary of the Navy Knox made to President Roosevelt soon after his return from a flying trip to the scene of the disaster.

Knox told Mr. Roosevelt that both the commanders at Pearl Harbor, Admiral Husband E. Kimmel and Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short, were completely surprised.

Third Attack Repulsed
Other points of the Knox report included:

1. Nothing but "ineffective machine gun fire" met the first of three waves of attacking Japanese planes, but the third wave was turned back.

2. American radio and other equipment was recovered from the wreckage of Japanese planes. One had a Lewis gun of 1920 vintage.

3. Knox attributed the lack of adequate fighter plane strength on Oahu before the war to diversion of aircraft to the British, Chinese and the Russians.

Oil Tanks Not Hit
Knox considered it significant that during the entire engagement, the Japanese dropped no bombs on oil storage tanks. He called this one indication which "appeared to foreshadow" a renewal of the attack in the near future.

Knox termed the loss of life and the number of wounded "a shocking result of unpreparedness."

Knox declared that neither Short nor Kimmel "knew of the plain intimations of some surprise move" which Knox said had been "made clear in Washington."

Hull's Note Not Seen
Admiral Harold R. Stark earlier told the investigators today that Secretary of State Hull handed him November 26, 1941, note to the Japanese without first informing the Army or Navy.

This note was later called an "ultimatum" by the Japanese and used as an excuse for war.

Hull already has testified that the November 26 note contained nothing that a peaceful country could not accept, but that the Japanese were "hell-bent for war."

There is also evidence that the task force which hit Pearl Harbor December 7, 1941, had already started before Hull gave the envoys the note.

It provides for support of egg prices at a U. S. average farm price of 29 cents a dozen during the flush production season next spring. Support will be accomplished through government purchases of dried, frozen, and graded shell eggs. Purchases by the government under the price support program will begin as heavy supplies threaten to force producer prices below the level

which reflects 90 per cent of parity — the minimum support level required under the Steagall amendment. Based upon the present level of parity this means a U. S. average farm price for all grades and sizes of edible eggs of about 29 cents a dozen during the spring flush.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Sarah L. Keezel, 86, early-day Oregon educator, died here at the home of her only daughter, Mrs. A. L. Pugaley, Thursday.

Mrs. Keezel was English and foreign language instructor at the now defunct Philomath College from 1890 to 1900. At that time Philomath was larger than Oregon State College.

Land Quits Post On Maritime Board

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—President Truman yesterday accepted the resignation of Vice Admiral Emory S. Land as chairman of the Maritime Commission and war shipping administrator, effective January 15.

An exchange of correspondence made public by the White House showed that Land had been trying to retire since last May.

His last request was made two days ago, when he wrote the President:

"Having served 39 years in the U. S. Navy and nearly nine years on the U. S. Maritime Commission (8 years as chairman) I feel that:

(A) I have done my bit;
(B) New blood is desirable;
(C) A younger man should take on the chores;

(D) Most of the major jobs, particularly war jobs, are practically finished—others are in hand insofar as practicality;

(E) I am 'war-weary'."

Land's resignation leaves both top posts in the Maritime Commission vacant.

Vice Chairman Howard Vickery resigned last week because of ill health.
