The regional forester reported \$639,085.59 paid to Washington, \$600,148.65 to Oregon—representing 25 per cent of receipts. An additional 10 per cent will be distributed for forest roads.

A successor to Harris will be chosen at the next meeting of the Council, January 21. Meanwhile, Wharton will continue as acting mayor.

Sanitary Code Urged
Mrs. Blessing, who as city health officer, urged passage and enforcement of standard sanitary codes as set by the state, for inspection of food handlers in local restaurants. Because of the overlapping authority of city, state, and county health officers, the matter was referred to the Council's health committee.

Appointment of Orvil C. John as temporary driver for the Fire Department was approved.

Fire Protection Agreed On
A proposal for a temporary contract with the city by the Roseburg Rural Fire Protection District, for fire protection services at rates set by the Council, was accepted. These rates are \$25 for answering calls and \$50 for routine equipment in operation. Council members said that contract with the Rural Fire Protection District would end contracts with nearby lumber mills for "standby" service.

Drainage Proposal Shelved
William D. Green, Jr., Sundale Village resident, who last month sought relief from the Council for a drainage condition in that area, submitted a resolution which the Council shelved, proposing a contract with a sanitary district which he said was in process of formation by Sundale Village residents, for the purpose of disposal of waste water through a city sewage connection. Council members said they would rather see that area come within the city limits.

The Council approved a suggestion by Councilman W. J. Mess that F. B. Cramhall, acting traffic engineer for the Oregon State Highway Commission be invited to make a traffic survey in Roseburg.

A zoning ordinance, 17 pages long, was submitted, and will be voted on when the Council meets again, Jan. 21.

Monthly reports of the police, fire, building inspection, streets and of the treasurer, were submitted.

Damage Claim Eyed
A letter from A. E. Davison, who owns the building on the banks of Deer Creek, at 546 N. Jackson street, sought relief for damages to his building said to have resulted from the construction of the Deer Creek bridge and retaining wall. The matter is to be investigated by the Council.

E. A. Jordan, 305 2nd street, South, complained of water damage to streets in his neighborhood last night. He named E. Douglas street, East 5th street, and E. Commercial street as being particularly bad.
