New Government Of Austria Given Allied Recognition

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—The United States formally recognized the government of Austria today and expressed hope that the first nation engulfed by Nazi Germany soon would achieve democracy and complete independence.

Russia, Britain and France joined this country in granting recognition to the Vienna regime headed by Chancellor Leopold Figl and President Karl Renner. The recognition does not affect the authority of the Allied Council, which will continue to carry out "Allied objectives in Austria."

These objectives, the simultaneous announcement said, include "eliminating Nazi influence and institutions in Austria, and assisting in the reconstruction of democratic life."

As they are achieved, the statement added, it is hoped that "a large-scale reduction may be made in the number of occupation troops of the four states (U. S., Russia, Britain, France) and that Austria may progressively acquire the status of an independent state."

Recognition of Austria left only Romania and Bulgaria among former enemy Balkan and Danube states still unrecognized by the United States. This government previously recognized new governments of Hungary, a former Axis satellite, and Yugoslavia, which never deserted the Allied cause although overrun by German forces in 1941.

Legion Officer to Study Oregon Vets' Problems

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—(AP)—A study of veterans' problems in Portland and Oregon will be started tomorrow by a national employment director of the American Legion. It was announced today.

State Commander Neil Morfitt said Ralph H. Levers, Washington, D. C., was making an "emergency trip" to Oregon because the employment problems of Oregon veterans can "no longer be neglected."

Minister Honored as "Junior First Citizen"

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—(AP) The Junior Chamber of Commerce has named Dr. Thompson L. Shannon, pastor of First Christian Church, the 1945 "Junior First Citizen."

Dr. Shannon served in 1945 as president of the Oregon Mental Hygiene Society, vice chairman of the State Liquor Control Commission's advisory committee and as member of the governor's Veterans and the Russian Relief Committees.

Jehovahite Wins Appeal on Right Of Street Vending

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The Supreme Court ruled 5-3 yesterday that a Jehovah Witness may not be barred from distributing set literature on property of the Gulf Shipbuilding Corporation at Chickasaw, Ala.

A court minority contended the majority decision represented "the first case to extend by law the privilege of religious exercises beyond public places to private places without the assent of the owner."

Justice Black spoke for the majority and Justice Reed for the minority which included Chief Justice Stone and Justice Burton. Justice Jackson did not participate.

The decision involved Grace Marsh who worked on a sidewalk of a business block owned by Gulf. It applied also to A. R. Tucker, of Hondo, Texas, a Jehovah Witness minister, who in another case was fined \$1 for his activities at a federal development known as Hondo Navigation Village. He appealed to the Supreme Court for a ruling on constitutionality of a Texas law which provided a fine of \$1 to \$25 for a peddler who refused to obey an order to get off a property.

Grace Marsh contended the use of the Chickasaw streets for ordinary purposes caused the town and corporation to be bound by the same constitutional restrictions against infringement of civil liberties as are imposed on all municipalities.

Justice Black said for the majority that managers appointed by Gulf "cannot curtail the liberty of press and religion of these people consistently with the purpose of the constitutional guarantees."

"A state statute, such as the one here involved," Black said, "which enforces such action by criminally punishing those who attempt to distribute religious literature clearly violates the first and 14th amendments of the Constitution."
