AMERICAN SHIPS will start
moving 26,000 Chungking troops
into Manchuria.

MANCHURIA is more or less
the key to China's future. It
is an important workshop of
heavy industry—something like
our Pittsburg area. It can be the
industrial backbone of a UNITED
China.

Split off into a separate na-
tion, as would have been the case
if the Chinese civil war had gone
down the whole road to separa-
tion and disunity, it could have
ended our hopes for a GREAT
China capable of growing into
our best customer.

THE thread of the CHINA
TRADE is woven into the
warp and woof of our entire his-
tory.

Columbus was seeking a trade
route to the ORIENT when he
stubbed his toe unexpectedly on
the then unknown Western Hem-
isphere. It was a GREAT DISAP-
POINTMENT, for he had hoped to
sail westward directly into the
ports whence came this rich and
coveted trade, thus short-circuit-
ing the long and slow and expen-
sive caravan routes by which the
products of the Orient reached the
Mediterranean and came
thence to western Europe by
ship. It was quite a jolt when he
learned that a huge and wild and
undeveloped continent lay in his
path.

For more than a century the
dream of bold adventurer-ex-
plorers was to find a short cut
around the northern end of this
annoying obstacle. The search for
a Northwest Passage (to China)
was unremitting, and the effort
to find it fills the annals of that
period.

MAKING the best of a bad bar-
gain, the nations of western
Europe began to found colonies
that lay across the path of their
hopes, and in time the northerly
colonies commenced to build
ships and found a commerce of
their own. Instinctively these
New England merchants turned
their faces toward the CHINA
coast, and for something like a
century their ports waxed rich on
the China trade.

These colonies built a way of
life of their own. Finding that
the claims binding them to the
Old World HAMPERED their
way of life, they pulled loose
from Mother England and set up
a nation of their own.

Their dream WORKED. The
nation they founded spread to
the west, reaching in time to the
Mississippi. Here again the VIS-
ION OF THE ORIENT recurred.
Why not, bold spirits reasoned,
leap clear across the deserts to
the Pacific Coast and there find
ports and found cities to carry on
the CHINA TRADE advantageously.

The ox-team pioneers took to
the trail to REALIZE the vision.

SPIRRED on by the centuries-
old dream of trade with the
Orient, they reached the Pacific.
They found the harbors. They
built the cities.

But the China trade proved dis-
appointing because China mean-
while had fallen from its ancient
eminence and become a battle-
ground for warring factions that
checked progress, impoverished
the Chinese people and so low-
ered their standards of living that
their buying power was reduced to
near the vanishing point.

Again the vision faded.

ONCE more it is dancing be-
fore our eyes as we see the
prospect of a REBORN China
that might quit fighting factional

THANKS TO BILL HARRIS

The resignation of Mayor W. F. (Bill) Harris accepted Monday night by the Roseburg city council, did not come as a surprise to councilmen or to the mayor's friends. It has been well known that he remained in office many months after his physician had not only advised but had ordered his complete retirement. But Mayor Harris was reluctant to leave his office. Even at critical risk to his impaired health he continued to direct city affairs until he felt he was no longer able to serve efficiently.

We can sympathize with the mayor's reluctance to resign from his office. He had no craving for the prestige and honor which goes with the position to which he was elected. Certainly, he did not relish the sacrifice of time from his thriving business, the many hours of hard work without remuneration, constant complaints and occasional abuse from dissatisfied residents.

But since the early 1900's he has been associated with public affairs, first as a member of the Roseburg school board. He became a member of the city council in 1929. He was a member of a special committee which obtained the site for the veterans facility. He was on the committee which worked out successfully plans for Roseburg's sewage disposal plant and intercepting sewer system. He was the council's member on the Public Library board for many years. During the administration of Mayor A. J. Young, whom he succeeded in office, he was president of the council, the city's second highest office.

During his many years as mayor and councilman he has been closely identified with municipal improvement. He has taken a keen interest in Roseburg's recent increased tempo of industrial and business development, and has been wrestling constructively with many important problems.

His reluctance to leave office, even in face of his physician's warnings, stems from provincial pride in his native soil, from his ardent desire to be of service, from his deep loyalty to the men who have shared with him the responsibility for city management, and from the associations developed through years of close and sincere attention to city affairs.

His long service merits the greatest measure of appreciation from Roseburg citizens.

In tendering his resignation, Mayor Harris urged a change to city manager form of government. His recommendation, we believe, is one which should receive prompt consideration. Our present form of city government, in our opinion, has been outmoded by our rapid growth.

We have been extremely fortunate, as a municipality, in the type of self-sacrificing men who have headed our city government, but we cannot ask busy men to spend as much time, at personal expense, as is now demanded in the handling of city affairs. The next few years will bring much more work than is now required. We are anticipating many changes in the next few years. Already suburban areas have grown to the point where health and safety are menaced by population growth. These communities are endangered by lack of sanitary facilities and police protection. Annexation cannot be postponed with safety over any great period of time. We are faced with zoning problems, building restrictions, increased fire and police protection, street construction, installation of storm and sanitary sewers, enlargement of sewage disposal facilities, airport construction, and many more problems. While we plan for expansion, we must continue efficiently the normal processes which make for clean and orderly living.

The routine of city management does not proceed unattended. It demands constant supervision, study, and service.

It is too much to ask men, busy with their own affairs, to give, without remuneration, rapidly increasing hours of time to routine. We have reached the point in our growth where our city demands full time service of a manager.

We deeply regret, personally, the necessity for the resignation of Bill Harris, for we feel he has earned a place with the best of the many fine men who have given unselfish devotion to city affairs. We hope citizens of our city will approve plans for a manager form of government which will lift some of the responsibility from the shoulders of our city officials, because we know full well that pressure of municipal affairs contributed in large measure to the breakdown in health of our retiring mayor and we should ask no man in the future to assume such an arduous burden.

WE ARE doubtful of our pres-

and goodwill toward us who have
helped them back onto the road

itself fully.

Mrs. Malcolmson
Certain "Pappy"
Not Jilting Her

RENO, Nev., Jan. 9.—(AP)—
"Pappy just isn't that kind of a
fellow," Mrs. Lucy Malcolmson
insisted today, despite reports
that Lt. Col. Gregory Boyington,
war hero, had no intention of
marrying her.

The 34-year-old brunette an-
nounced last week she and Colo-
nel Boyington, holder of the Con-
gressional Medal of Honor, former
"Flying Tiger" and leader of the
"Black Sheep Squadron" in the
Pacific, would be married im-
mediately after she obtained a di-
vorce from Stewart Malcolmson,
General Motors production manager
in Australia.

In San Diego on Monday, Colo-
nel Boyington said he did not
plan to marry her. He has not
been available for comment since
then.

"In spite of all I've heard on
the radio and seen in the papers,"
Mrs. Malcolmson told newsmen,
"I just don't believe Greg would do
what he appears to have done."

"I still like Pappy, and think
he's about the sweetest Marine
that ever walked down the
street."

Divorce Hearing Off.
However, Mrs. Malcolmson did
not appear in court for her di-
vorce hearing yesterday, and it
was removed from the court cal-
endar.

In Los Angeles, the Marine
flyer's attorney, Arthur G. Miller,
said he had called Mrs. Malcolm-
son's lawyer and told him "to ad-
vise Mrs. Malcolmson not to pro-
ceed with her divorce action if it
depended on her plan of marry-
ing Boyington."

Miller said he had been in-
structed by Colonel Boyington to
tell Mrs. Malcolmson's lawyer
that he "had no intention" of
marrying her.

Joseph P. Haller, her attorney,
made public a series of tele-
grams, full of endearing phrases,
which he said Mrs. Malcolmson
told him she received from Boy-
ington while en route from New
York to Reno to get a divorce.

Those telegrams, Miller com-
mented in Los Angeles, embody
"nothing of a promise of matri-
mony" by Boyington.

Goering's Part in
Crimes Summed
Up By Prosecutor

NUERNBERG, Germany, Jan.
9.—(AP)—The United States com-
pleted a four-hour accusation
yesterday against Herman Goer-
ing, who was described as "more
dangerous in some respects"
than Hitler, and the British
launched into the prosecution of
ghost-faced Joachim von Ribben-
tropp.

Hour after hour, Ralph H. Al-
brecht gave a careful tabulation
of ruthless deeds of Goering, as
verified by captured German
papers. Virtually all had been
submitted earlier to the interna-
tional military tribunal, trying
the 22 ranking Nazis as war
criminals.

Goering was shown to have
negotiated prominently for the
absorption of Austria, to have
given false assurances of friend-
ship to Poland, to have ordered
the first million slave workers
brought to Germany from Poland
and to have sponsored the art
looting programs for most of
occupied Europe. His major role
in the impoverishment and per-
secution of the Jews was retold
and his plan for exploiting Soviet
Russia resources was mentioned.

The former Reichsmarschal
squirmed wearily when Albrecht
called him "the father of the
Gestapo and the concentration
camp."

Then a former British attorney
general, Sir David Maxwell Fyfe,
started presenting the case
against Ribbentrop, former Ger-
man foreign minister, whom he
branded as "an extraordinary
mediator" in virtually every phase
of Nazi aggression.

In a sarcastic voice, Sir David
recreated the diplomatic career
of the former champagne sales-
man from 76 German state
papers.

Landslide Menaces
Six Homes in Astoria

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 8.—(AP)—
A landslide here has endangered
six homes, breaking off front
porches, cracking lawns and side-
walks and snapping power lines.
Slipping of the hill, on 23rd
street, has pulled buildings down
from a few inches to several
feet. Water has been cut off from
the Ray Hendrickson home.
