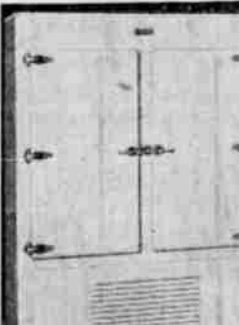

Lynam, Ross Top Mat Card; Achiu to Battle Smallinski

Joe Lynam, popular holder of the Pacific Coast junior heavyweight wrestling title, will appear in the headline attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly mat show at the Roseburg Armory arena next Saturday night. But the Redmond athlete and ex-army sergeant will not be defending his coveted crown.

The former Australian champion was originally scheduled to defend his title against Jack Kiser if the ex-coast light-heavy titleholder had beaten Tony Ross, but the "Toledo Terror" registered a technical victory over the St. Johns adonis, and therefore will take Kiser's place in the main event—but not in a title tilt.

Ross looked impressive in his first appearance here in several months. He defeated Kiser by applying a series of backbreakers from which Jack failed to recover in time to continue the match.

Lynam will need all of his dynamic style to get past Ross, who is campaigning for both the coast junior heavy and light heavyweight titles. The former middleweight boxing flash doesn't resort to fisticuffs alone, but has a well-grounded grappling style to go along with some of his questionable tactics.

Owen has scheduled an interesting semi-final attraction—a match between Walter Tinkit Achiu and Babe Smallinski, the new Polish villain who was impressive in his local debut last week against Ernie Puluso.

Roseburg Fire Damage Small During December

Fire Chief Glenn H. Taylor reported \$40 damage in fires during the month of December, while \$28,000 worth of property was at risk in eight calls to extinguish overheated chimney fires. The fire chief made 26 inspections and discovered two fire hazards which he ordered removed. Eight fire permits were granted during the month.

In his role as building inspector, Taylor reported 141 building permits issued during 1945 covering the following construction: New dwellings, sheds, private garages, \$219,425; new mercantile buildings, \$132,500; additions, repairs and remodelings, \$84,925, a total of \$436,850 during 1945.

GIs in Japan Rebuked For Demonstration

come direct from the War Department.

It came as soldiers in this area called for a mass demonstration tomorrow before Eighth Army headquarters.

General Hall said the redeployment of 191,183 men from Japan as of Dec. 31 far overshadowed the 53,973 replacements received in the same period "and if this unequal percentage continues, our forces in the occupied countries will be left in a precarious position."

He added that there had been no reduction of troops during January and that eligible men would be redeployed according to plan.

Mahoney Bitter in Rebuke
"I told them to stop or I would take steps to break it up immediately," Mahoney said. "I asked them if they were soldiers or Boy Scouts."

A mimeographed paper, "Discharge," circulated among soldiers, quoted Mahoney additionally: "If you want to go home I'll

take you home. I'll see that you get to my Yokohama prison. You're insulting a man who's a better GI than any of you."

"If you want lace panties I'll get them for you. Just let me hear you sing 'I Want to Go Home' again and I'll pick out two or three singers and personally take them over to my Yokohama prison."

Mahoney denied telling the men, "You are acting like a lot of G-D-babies" as stated in the paper.

The colonel asserted that soldiers who gathered in front of the adjutant general's building were stirred up by "a lot of communists and hoodlums."

Protest at Honolulu

At Honolulu last night, 1,500 soldiers staged a noisy protest meeting against the demobilization program in front of post headquarters of Lt. Gen. Robert C. Richardson, Jr., who in the afternoon had urged that no "mob action demonstration" be staged in Hawaii.

The demonstrators voted to send their views to President Truman. A larger mass meeting was scheduled for Saturday.

T-4 David Livingston, of New York City, addressing the crowd, said: "We are here because there seems to be a foreign policy developing which requires one hell of a big army. It's about time we joined our buddies in the Philippines and said, 'Yes, let's occupy enemy countries but not friendly countries.'"

He referred to parades and protest meetings in Manila and other parts of the Philippines against the garrisoning of those islands. One group of 4,000 protesting GIs in the Philippines have voted to finance protest advertisements in newspapers in the United States.

At the Honolulu meeting, T-4 Martie Bernstein, Los Angeles, circulated a petition to be sent to President Truman "protesting vigorously and emphatically a slowdown of demobilization as announced by the War Department."

The petition asked for a 10 point per month drop in discharge points, effective in February, release of all two-year men on March 2 and immediate use of all available ships to carry home men due to be discharged.

The work stoppage, which was in protest of a War Labor Board decision which revised downward a wage award by a regional board, slowed down international cable communications. A Western Union official said that not more than 15 per cent of the normal daily traffic was transmitted at the company's main office yesterday.

Non-union members worked in 25 branch offices in the city and incoming telegrams were relayed by telephone to addressees. A system of priorities for accepting telegrams, based on a wartime list, was established by the company.

Elsewhere along the labor front, efforts continued by government officials to halt the nationwide strikes scheduled next week in the steel and meat-packing industries, which would add more than a million workers to the ranks of idles because of labor disputes.

Roseburg Needs Full Time Manager, Ex-Mayor Asserts

W. F. Harris, who resigned Monday as mayor of Roseburg, yesterday viewed his office as one which requires a full-time occupant to devote all his energies to bearing the burden resulting from the city's increase in population, and to face the complexities of modernizing the municipal services.

When he sent his letter of resignation to the City Council Monday night, he said he was "convinced" the city needed a manager form of government. Neither he nor other members of the Council had the time necessary to devote to city affairs without "financial loss to themselves."

Following his doctor's orders last August, Harris said he had stayed away from "anything and everything" that would delay his recovery from a physical breakdown. The city's affairs had become so heavy he could no longer carry them.

Both Harris and Charles W. Wharton, president of the City Council, favor a city manager plan, in which the city's affairs would be directed by one individual giving his whole time to the job.

Harris expressed his appreciation to the City Council for light-

ening his load. He had not attended his meetings since August, and he felt the time had come for him to give up his position as mayor. Harris has been in the city's service so long, both as councilman and as mayor, he has forgotten the exact date he entered service.
