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Repairs Listed for Port Facilities

REEDSPORT — Repair of port facilities was given consideration by the Port of Umpqua Commission at its regular meeting Monday. Cooperation with the county court in repairs to the dock at Winchester Bay was approved, and the commission also voted to cooperate with the City of Reedport in improvements to dock facilities at the foot of Rainbow Plaza, where it is proposed to build a new floating dock and a slip for river, pleasure and fish boats.

J. T. Branson, who is improving the recreation resort at Bill's Fish Farm near Scottsburg, was given permission to drive piling for a dock and mooring.

New property leases were ordered drawn for the Bridge Lumber Company and the Columbia River Packers Association, which are tenants on port property.

Japs Who Renounced U. S. Citizenship Would Stay

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 8. (AP) — More than 3000 evacuees at the Tulelake WRA center want to stay in the United States despite their renunciation of American citizenship.

This was disclosed yesterday when the Department of Justice opened hearings at the center for renunciations who have indicated their unwillingness to go to Japan.
