## Boxing, Wrestling Bouts are Staged At Jr. High School

Thirty-six wrestlers and boxers, ranging in weight from mere 50-pounders to 170-pound heavies, appeared on a full card at the smoker last night in the Junior High School. In the main event of the evening, Daun Lillard, 170 pounds, emerged as victor over Ken "One Punch" Ford, 170 pounds, in a boxing match in which both contestants maulled each other in a fast exchange of blows. Each was knocked to the floor, or was sent sprawling against the ropes, in a fight that was close.

Last night's program began with two bouts between little fellows that ended in draws. Billy Johnson, 60, met Milo Coffman, 62, and Fritz Schyptie, 50, fought Roy Gray, 52, in a match which one spectator described as the "cutest darn thing I ever saw!"

George Packard, 115, defeated Doyle Ellis, 112, who retired with a bloody nose. Sonny Oden, 120, met Maynard Tally, 120, and Maynard won. Eric Olson, 153, with his chin thrust out in grim determination, which may have been because of the cotton he clamped between his jaws as a guard for his teeth, defeated Alfred Morsette, 158, in a good fight.

Dale Cordray, 120, used a wicked back hand stroke to defeat Oliver Durand, 115, whose white jersey was splattered with crimson at the end of the bout.

**Wrestling Results**  
Among the wrestlers, Von Sanders, 161, won the decision over Perry Rayburn, 161. Clare Pettit, 135, forced Art Croucher, 135, to yield. Gary Egger, 169, won the third wrestling match with Bud Rodgers, 160. At one point Egger gained such a firm and vice-like grip on his opponent's arm, that Rodgers' torso and legs flopped as wildly as a fish.

Two young twins, Lloyd and Howard Strombold, each 120, opened the second half with an exchange of fistcuffs. It was a draw. Lloyd Mayburn, 135, won over Wesley Ashworth, red-haired 135-pounder. Clem Van Schult, 130, boxed Dale Gusee, 130. Leslie Johnson, 140, a short, chubby fighter, was matched with Bob Sanders, 145, who stood a head taller than he. Rick Chartier, 140, defeated Junior Culp, 145. Earl Whitte lost a decision to Bill Anderson.

Two wrestling matches in the second half matched Lloyd Johnson, 135, with Marry Ramp, 134, and Larry Hutchins with Bob Horn. Johnson and Hutchins were winners.

Officials in last night's game included Abe Boan as timekeeper, Dick Gilman and Orle Kennerlie, Jr., as boxing referees, Pfc. Marvin Eppes as wrestling referee.

war, which provide severe penalties for such criticism. Nor is the paper to publish soldiers' letters which could be construed as discourteous or derogatory to authority. The order holds the paper's staff strictly responsible and subject to disciplinary action for violations, but exempts news received by Stars and Stripes from federal statutes.

In Washington the War Department had no immediate comment on reports of Richardson's statement to the Army paper. The 62nd article of war says: "Any officer who uses contemptuous or disrespectful words against the president, vice-president, the Congress of the United States, the secretary of war, or the governor or legislature of any state, territory, or other possession of the United States in which he is quartered shall be dis-

missed from the service or suffer such other punishment as a court martial may direct."

(Then, making the provision applicable to all military personnel, the article says: "Any other persons subject to military law who so offend shall be punished as a court martial may direct.")

(The 63rd article also says that "any person subject to military law who behaves himself with disrespect toward his superior officer shall be punished as a court martial may direct.")

**Eisenhower Applauded**  
Manila—Thousands of soldiers whooped as they learned of General Eisenhower's authorization for theater commanders to send home any men deemed not necessary to occupation. T-4 Harold Schiffrin, temporary chairman of a demobilization protest committee, said "it's a great step forward and an intelligent one" but that the committee would adopt a wait and see attitude before disbanding.

Seoul, Korea—Thousands of soldiers, at a mass meeting, vociferously but respectfully demanded a congressional inquiry of the demobilization slowdown. "We cannot understand the War Department's insistence on keeping an overzealous peacetime army overseas under present conditions," stated a resolution. Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge, occupation commander, was present to answer questions.

Honolulu—Five members of a congressional committee studying Hawaii's application for statehood attended a mass meeting of 10,000 GIs who roared their approval of a four-point demobilization speedup.

**Confusion Results**  
Richardson's orders to Honolulu Stars and Stripes came as a surprise. The general previously had supported the GI editorial board of enlisted men in its outspoken policies. In an editorial Tuesday, Stars and Stripes had pointed out discrepancies in statements of demobilization emanating from the War Department and asserted that Pacific GIs, as a result,

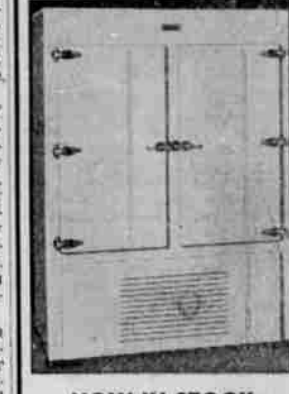
were confused" and did not know whom to believe. It said that if men with two years' service were not released by March 20, as promised informally some time ago by General Marshall, the Army would have broken faith with the troops.

At Honolulu's Hickam Field, 10,000 outspoken GIs roared approval of a resolution asking Congress to enact this four-point program:

1. Make Army personnel with two years service eligible for discharge by March 20.
2. Reinstatement of the cumulative discharge point system as of Sept. 2, when it was discontinued.
3. Reduce the critical score for discharge by 10 points per month. It now is 50 points, a reduction from 85 as of V-J day.
4. Eliminate essential classifications for men eligible for discharge.

The Congressmen who attended the meeting insisted they were present only as spectators. They are Reps. Henry D. Larcade, Jr., (D-La.), Dean Taylor (R-Sv.), George P. Miller (D-Calif.), Homer D. Angell (R-Ore.), and
