4 Accused of Fraud in "Oyster Bed" Promotion

PORTLAND, Jan. 9. (AP)—Three Salem men and a Portlander charged with using the mails to defraud in promotion of "oyster bed" sales in Coos Bay tidelands will go on trial here Feb. 25, Federal Judge Fee said today.

Edgar Robert Errion, John Richard Barton and Glenn H. Munkers, Salem, and P. E. Blackman, Portland, were indicted last October and are free on \$10,000 bond.

The grand jury indictment reported they received \$300,000 from Willamette valley farmers and Oregon and Washington coast residents they interested in an investment plan in Coos Bay oyster farming.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 10. (AP)—Oregon 4-H youngsters earned \$126,506.23 last year from livestock sold in 13 auctions, the 4-H Club office said.

A total of 1,215 animals were sold, at an average price of \$103.72 per hundred pounds for sheep, \$24.97 for hogs, \$27.37 for beef.

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R. Stanleigh Buys Printing Business

One Peace Justice Sues Another for "Hornin' In"

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 9. (AP)—One justice of the peace here has filed suit against another, accusing him of cashing in on the lucrative marriage trade in downtown Vancouver—long a Gretna Green for Oregon couples.

Justice Paul Elwell, whose office is in the courthouse, charged Justice L. C. Gaspard with moving into his precinct—in fact, to an office just across the street. He seeks \$3,500 damages.

Superior Court Judge E. G. Cushing granted Elwell a temporary restraining order on the grounds that Gaspard's legal precinct is Ogden Meadows war housing project, outside city limits.
