

Family is Barrier To Teaching Post

Young bachelors, or single women, who become teachers have an excellent chance to enter the Roseburg school system. But men with families? They haven't a chance here, because there is no housing for them. Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott today said the additions to the teaching staff of the Roseburg schools must be confined to single people, or to local residents whose housing problem is solved.

The matter of housing was under discussion yesterday at a general meeting of Roseburg teachers in the Fullerton School, Elliott said. Meager accommodations and crowded living quarters, and a rise in the general cost of living made it difficult for members of the teaching staff to meet their obligations during the past year, it was reported by the salary committee. A survey made of other first class school districts will guide recommendations to the school board, Elliott said.

An acute shortage of instructors and the loss of two or three prospective teachers whom Elliott said he needed, were laid to the housing situation.

Divorce Granted Bernarr M'Fadden

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 10.—(AP)—Bernarr MacFadden, 77-year-old physical culturist, was granted a final divorce decree today from the British beauty contest winner whom he accused of "humiliat-

ing" him by losing her trim figure during their 33 years of married life.

The decree from Circuit Judge Paul D. Barnes was awarded after a 3-year court fight during which sensational charges frequently were written into the record.

They had seven children. Much of their domestic difficulties centered around the children—Mrs. MacFadden, the former Mary Williamson, accusing her hus-

band of endangering their health by ordering one child dipped in cold water daily and all of them to dance in the open on wintry days clad in flimsy garments.

She claimed, too, that her business astuteness benefited MacFadden. Displaying a photograph of her husband standing on his head, she testified: "He would still be standing on his head except for me. I put him on his feet."

Portland Physicians Buy Site for Medical Center

The purchase is reported to have involved approximately \$70,000.
