

Sportsmen Plan Buy Of Winchester Tract

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The tract includes land for a distance of approximately 3500 feet downstream from the highway bridge at Winchester and back from the river to the county road. Long range development plans call for installation of a club house, trapshooting grounds, boat mooring, picnic grounds, etc.

Purchase of the property is expected to be completed this month, it was announced. The club is borrowing funds to acquire the land and is relying upon public assistance in developing the site for public use. The owners, Gantenbein and Gardner, it was stated, sold the land to the Rod and Gun Club for several thousand dollars less than they had previously been offered by speculators in order that its recreational values might be preserved for the public. The club is purchasing the site for \$7,500.

Fish Proposals Endorsed

The recommendation of the club's committee that Chinook salmon fishing on the North and South forks of the Umpqua river be halted after July 15, to protect salmon after they had reached their spawning grounds was unanimously adopted. The membership also approved without dissent the proposal to close all tributary waters east of the Pacific Highway to winter fishing. Tributaries now are open to fishing for steelhead and salmon, or fish over 20 inches in length, at any time of the year. The new ruling, if approved and enacted by the Game Commission, would close these streams Oct. 31 and they would remain closed until the opening of trout season the

following year. The main North and South Umpqua rivers would not be affected.

Would Raise Lake Level

The Roseburg club was asked to join in recommendations by the South Umpqua Rod and Gun Club to halt Chinook salmon and steelhead fishing on the South Umpqua river above Jackson Creek after July 10, to close Castle Rock Creek to fishing after July 10, and to recommend raising the water of Fish Lake by construction of a dam at the outlet, to prevent loss of small fish by uncovering spawning beds during periods of low water.

The Roseburg club endorsed the resolutions, with the exception that the date of July 10 will be changed, with the consent of the South Umpqua club, to July 15, the date suggested for general closing of Chinook fishing on both streams.

It was reported by representatives of the South Umpqua club, that a change in water level at Fish Lake during the dry season causes gravel bars to be uncovered and the mouths of small streams flowing into the lake. These small streams are used as spawning grounds by Rainbow trout, and because of the barrier, the small fish are unable to reach the lake before the streams dry up in the summer months. By raising the level of the lake two or three feet it is estimated that thousands of fish would be saved annually. The recommendations of the club also include shortening the season at the lake to permit fishing only while the station is manned by forest service personnel. The change also would protect fish until after their spawning season in late April and early May.

Delegates Appointed
Bruce Yeager, Earl Duncan and

Kenneth Gilkeson were appointed to submit the recommendations to the game commission at a meeting in Portland Saturday.

President John Amacher, who meting, was authorized to appoint delegates and alternates to attend the Oregon Wildlife Federation meeting in Corvallis January 25 and 26.

Army Revising Plan

The announcement that the Army was redrafting its demobilization program and less than a week after the War Department ordered its demobilization slow-down which touched off the series of GI demonstrations in the Pacific and Europe.

This slow-down order was the first drastic change in demobilization policy since the broad general program was announced after V-E day.

There was no hint what lines the new demobilization program would follow, but the Army promised that the revised plan would be forthcoming "shortly."

Despite Eisenhower's order and the promise of a new demobilization program, increasing dissatisfaction with the entire situation was voiced on Capitol Hill by some lawmakers returning for the opening session of Congress next week.

Senator George A. Wilson (R-Iowa) was of the opinion that both Army and Navy release programs are so snarled that only Congressional action can get them untangled.

He told reporters he will propose that Congress order the release by April 1 of all enlisted personnel except volunteers or draftees with less than a year's service.

Disclosure that a detailed new Army demobilization program is in the works was made yesterday by Acting Secretary of War Kenneth C. Royall, who released Eisenhower's cabled directive instructing overseas commanders to expedite the return of surplus personnel regardless of point scores.

This directive from the Army chief of staff specified, however, that priority should be given men with the highest scores and the longest service.

"Up To People," Devers Says
General Devers voiced his concern about the demobilization picture last night in an address at Colorado Springs, Colo. He said the job of occupation was handed to the Army "by the President, the Congress and the people" and required "a large number of men."

"It is up to the people," he asserted, to decide whether they want the Army rapidly disbanded or given "requisite occupational forces" to help win the peace.

The possibility of uprising, due to food shortages, made this winter a critical time in both Europe and the Pacific, he contended.
