Expresses Objections to "Sustained Yield" Plan. I have been reading your editorials in the News-Review on the sustained yield question with a great deal of interest. Every time I read one of these I wonder which one of the government bureaus—O. & C. or Forest Service—has been in to see you and gave this government-sponsored project a boost.

CONSERVATION MEASURES

A program of protection for spawning beds of Chinook salmon and Steelheads, has been initiated by the sportsmen's clubs of Roseburg and the South Umpqua district. This action which has been too long delayed and should, in our opinion, meet with immediate favorable rulings by the Oregon State Game Commission, to which the proposals will be submitted.

The interesting factor in proposals of the two organizations is the difference in attitude between sports fishermen and commercial fishermen in the matter of conservation. Sports fishermen are proposing to impose new and drastic restrictions upon themselves, because they believe that by so doing they can salvage some recreational benefits for future generations.

Two of the suggestions made by the Douglas County clubs are of great importance as conservation measures, although neither seriously affects real sportsmen. They will, however, be unpopular among game hogs and persons who have wantonly destroyed fish life in past years. One proposal would prohibit taking Chinook salmon in the North and South Umpqua rivers after July 15.

Another conservation measure is found in the proposal to close tributary streams, east of the Pacific highway, to winter fishing. At present there is no restriction, except in specified streams, against angling for fish more than 20 inches in length, which, under Game Commission rulings, are classified as salmon.

The prime necessity in preserving fisheries resources on the Umpqua river, in our opinion, is the removal of barriers, resulting from nets of commercial fishermen, to the migration of fish. But of equal importance is the protection of spawning beds after the fish have made their migration.

where cut fairly clean, with very few trees left, either on the ground or standing. Now take a look at areas being cut adjacent to them. On these lands you will find that there is being left standing from 20 to 40 per cent of old growth trees, also you will find another 30 to 40 per cent of the felled trees left on the ground.

Douglas fir grown best in an even aged stand of clear Douglas fir timber. The reason for this is that it is very intolerant of shade and will not grow as an under-story crop as some other trees, such as hemlock or white fir. Therefore, it will not reproduce under a selective cutting program.

It appears to me that instead of establishing these so-called "sustained yield units," it would be very much better to harvest our old growth over mature Douglas fir timber as fast as there is a market for the lumber. Burn the remaining slash and give it adequate protection from fire, so that a new crop of Douglas fir can come in. Also stop old harvesting of our young second growth Douglas fir until the old crop is harvested.

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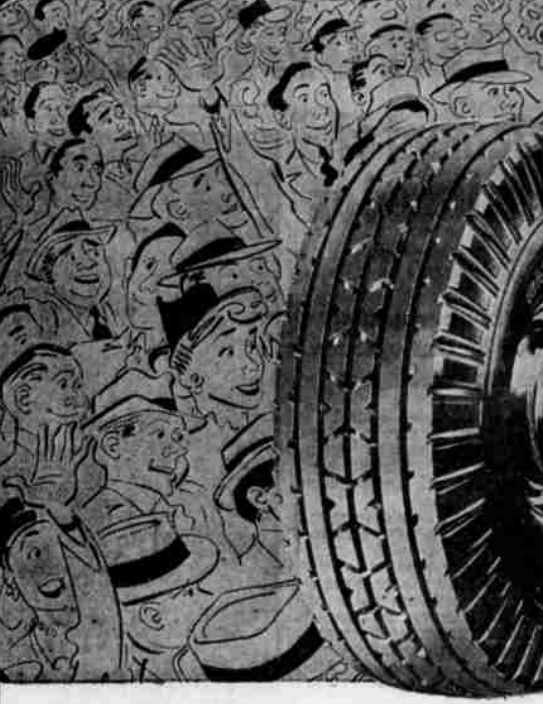
