O. S. C. Leads Colleges in Winter Enrollments

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 11.—(AP)—Oregon State College led Oregon's higher educational institutions with a 97 per cent jump in winter term enrollment compared with last year, incomplete statistics showed today.

The state's colleges had a total increase of 72 per cent, or 3,300 more students. About 25 per cent—2,900 in all—were veterans. The enrollment boost was 89 per cent at Southern Oregon College of Education; 69 per cent, University of Oregon; 62 per cent, Eastern Oregon College of Education; 23 per cent, Oregon College of Education. The university medical school, with military trainees withdrawn, lost 7 per cent.

Only the housing shortage kept the figure from plummeting higher at Oregon and Oregon State, officials said.

Hiring Hall Puts Labor Into Lumber Jobs Here

More than 80 sawmill hands and loggers were placed last month in the Roseburg area through Dick Gilman's Hiring Hall; very good for this time of year, he said.

In the boom that spring will bring to logging operations and sawmills, Gilman foresees a shortage of rigging men, a fair supply of sawmill hands, and a large surplus of fallers and buckers.

Lumber output for this area is 40 per cent greater than last year at this time Gilman said. He predicted that employment opportunities in this area will be good.

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Kidnaper, 11 Years In Prison, Wants to Reverse His Plea

TACOMA, Jan. 11.—(AP)—After serving 11 years of a 45-year sentence for his part in the kidnaping of George Weyerhaeuser of Tacoma in 1935, Harmon Metz Waley, now in Alcatraz prison, has formally notified the U. S. court clerk here that he wants to change his plea from guilty to innocent of the charge on which he was sentenced.

In his statement he claims that the late Edward E. Cushman, then district judge, who sentenced him "was intimidated by the community, divers other persons and a conspiracy" to deprive him of a fair and impartial trial, and he was not informed of his right to a jury trial.

He further alleges that the court and other agents of the government "have for 11 years got down and rolled in the gutter in order to deprive" him of a fair trial.

William Dainard also was sentenced to 60 years for participation in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping.
