

Achieu, Smallinski Will Battle In Mat Semi-Final

Walter Tinkit Achieu, rated as the top Chinese wrestler of the present day, will meet Babe Smallinski, rough and tough Polish villain, in the semi-final attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly wrestling show at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

The semi-final might well have been booked as part of a double headliner, the two grapplers ranking among the leaders in their respective divisions. It will be a match between a veteran who knows all of the answers—Achieu—and a ruffian who is in top condition after serving the Army as an instructor in com-

mando tactics—Smallinski. Achieu will probably have to resort to jiu-jitsu in order to equal the advantage the Polish villain will have in strength and weight. He tips the beam at more than 200 pounds, at least 25 pounds heavier than Achieu.

Interest among Douglas County wrestling followers, however, is centered heavier around the main event between Joe Lynam and Tony Ross. Lynam is the Pacific coast junior heavyweight champion, holder of one of the two titles Ross is campaigning for. The coast crown will not be at stake, but Ross can make a definite title bid if he triumphs as impressively as he did against Jack Kiser last week. Kiser was scheduled for a title tilt against Lynam if he had decided on the "Toledo Terror."

Ross, a former middleweight boxing flash, usually combines excellent basic wrestling with some fistfuls, but his victory over Kiser was won with a back-breaker. He will find Lynam a formidable foe, a young matman who held the Australian championship while serving in the Army as a sergeant. While the match may not develop into as rough a brawl as the Smallinski-Achieu skirmish, it will be packed with dynamite, color and interest.

The usual three-round boxing exhibition, featuring local talent, will open the program at 8:30 o'clock. Elton Owen will referee all three matches.

RHS Cagers Set For Friday Tilt With Junction City

Roseburg High's hoop team is set to meet Junction City here tonight, then will travel to North Bend tomorrow to avenge a defeat handed the Indians earlier in the season.

Junction City brings a strong team here. Coach Mel Ingram said this morning. The Junction City boys have defeated Cottage Grove, and this week won over Springfield 33 to 20, making them one of the strong contenders for the league championship.

The game tonight, at 8 P. M., will be preceded by a preliminary match between the sophomore teams of the two schools. Last week Roseburg showed improvement in back-board recoveries and a tight defensive, when they won their tilt with University Hi of Eugene. Ingram said this morning he was sending his boys into the game confident of their chances for victory.

Half-time entertainment will be furnished this evening by the Knights of Pythias Girls Drum Corps, making its first appearance with valve bugles. The corps will demonstrate its technique when entertaining and participating in a state drum corps contest.

The Bearded Aces are the official traveling basketball team of the Laramie House of David and go by the official name of the City of David Bearded Aces. It was announced that they would appear here again February 12, in a contest with the Kansas City Stars on the floor of the Roseburg High School gymnasium. Jesse Owens, famed Negro track star, will appear during the half-time intermission of the game.

Karstens, center for the Bearded Aces, played to the crowd, kept in a continual uproar by his antics. Whenever Roseburg committed a foul, he pointed an accusing finger and shouted, "Cheater, cheater!" When interest lagged and the game's pace slackened, he indulged in juggling acts with the ball that fascinated spectators, and even resorted to a trick basketball play with a collapsible bat.

Fighting Breaks Out in Russ-Held Iran District

TEHERAN, Jan. 10.—(AP)—A government announcement said today that fighting had broken out in two Russian-occupied provinces in Northern Iran. One person was reported killed and two others wounded at Kazvin, in Kazvin province, where the government said a "group of immigrants and strangers" fired upon voters during a provincial election.

The ministry said the attacks occurred Tuesday after "attempts to intimidate the voters" failed.

The Russians have been sta-

tioned in Northern Iran since 1941 under a wartime agreement with the government and the Anglo-American allies.

Ceiling Prices on Eggs Scheduled to Decline Further

Increasingly heavy receipts of eggs at representative Oregon plants were noted in the week ending January 9, resulting in a somewhat weaker market tone, even though prices still held at ceiling levels, according to the weekly egg and poultry review prepared by the OSC extension service from USDA market reports and other data.

For the first time this season, receipts in Oregon were heavier than during the corresponding week a year ago by 10 per cent. Production, however, continues to lag behind last year for the Pacific Coast as a whole.

At Portland, large grade AA eggs sold to retailers at 54 cents, large A's at 52, medium, 47, and small 43 cents. Large and medium eggs are 7 cents less than a month ago and small 3 cents less. All are the same as a year ago.

Storms in the midwest curtailed production and delivery of eggs temporarily but supplies in market channels are much freer than they were a few weeks ago. Some midwest eggs have been offered at Pacific Coast markets.

Ceiling prices of eggs are scheduled to decline another 2 to 3 cents on all grades January 10. At Portland, liberal offerings of broiler's and fryers recently, some of which have been of inferior quality, have resulted in a weaker market.

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A "Look at the Books" OR "A Finger in the Pie"?

Which is the UAW-CIO really after? Is it seeking facts—or new economic power? Does it want to know things—or run things? These questions concern you as well as General Motors.

In spite of this, the UAW-CIO demands a chance to look at our books, with the hint that we could meet Union demands "if the truth were really known."

We have firmly declined to recognize this as a basis for bargaining:

1. The Full Facts are Published

How much General Motors takes in each year—how much it pays employees—how much it pays to stockholders—how much it pays in taxes—how much net profit we make—and many other facts are plainly stated in annual reports and quarterly reports.

These are broadcast to 425,000 stockholders from coast to coast—sent to newspapers and libraries. Additional copies are free for the asking.

2. All Figures are Thoroughly Checked

Every General Motors annual statement is audited by outside auditors. Similar figures are filed with the Securities & Exchange Commission.

Does the UAW-CIO honestly believe that General Motors would or could deceive these experts?

3. Basis of Collective Bargaining is Defined

The Wagner Act lays down the rules for collective bargaining. These cover such areas as rates of pay, hours of work, working conditions.

No mention is made of earnings, prices, sales volume, taxes and the like. These are recognized as the problems of management.

4. Something New has been Added

The obvious fact is that the UAW-CIO has gone beyond its rights under the law—and is reaching not for information but for new power—not for a look at past figures, but for the power to sit in on forecasting and planning the future.

A "look at the books" is a clever catch phrase intended as an opening wedge whereby Unions hope to pry their way into the whole field of management.

It leads surely to the day when Union bosses, under threat of strike, will demand the right to tell what we can make, when we can make it, where we can make it, and how much we must charge you—all with an eye on what labor can take out of the business, rather than on the value that goes into the product.

5. This Threatens All Business

If the Union can do this in the case of General Motors, it can do it to every business in this land of ours.

Is this just imagination? Union spokesmen have said, "The Union has stated time after time that this issue is bigger than just an ordinary wage argument, that it is bigger than the Corporation and bigger than the Union."

For Labor Unions to use the monopolistic power of their vast membership to extend the scope of wage negotiations to include more than wages, hours and working conditions is the first step toward handing the management of business over to the Union bosses.

We therefore reject the idea of a "look at the books" not because we have anything to hide but because the idea itself hides a threat to GM, to all business, and to you, the public.

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
