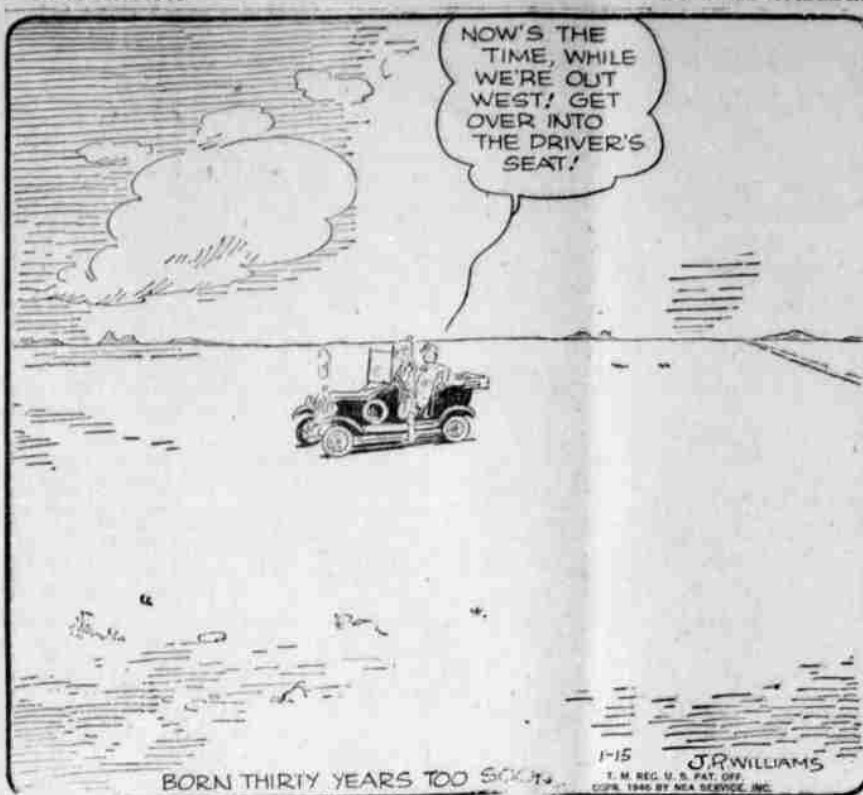

Bodies of Bataan March Victims Being Found

MANILA, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Bodies of Americans slain by the Japanese during the death march from Bataan still are being recovered as mute testimony of the 1942 brutalities, a graves registration officer testified at the trial of Lt. Gen. Homma.

Victoriano Alabado, Methodist minister who has been assisting in the grim task, testified that among bodies recovered was that of Maj. James N. Vaughn, who earlier witnesses said was brutally slain by Japanese guards. Homma, former Japanese commander in the Philippines, is charged with responsibility for mass atrocities.

Alabado testified that he went along the route of the death march in 1942, seeking a son who was in the Philippine Army.

"I saw sights I do not like to remember," he said.

In a two and a half-mile stretch, he saw 62 bodies strewn along the road. He also saw Americans beaten with clubs when they attempted to drink at roadside wells.

Divorce Court Writes Wrestling Bout Verdict

LANCASTER, Pa., Jan. 14.—(AP)—Nineteen-year-old Mrs. David N. Norcross won a divorce, claiming her husband experted her in wrestling bouts. She twice threw the 25-year-old Navy dischargee pretty hard, said the wife, and he retaliated, hurting her feelings.

Influenza Cases Cut by Army's New Type of Vaccine

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—(AP)—The Army's new anti-flu "shots" are producing encouraging results, the surgeon general reported today.

Preliminary indications, he said, are that the wartime-developed vaccine has reduced the incidence of influenza among men in uniform.

At the same time, the U. S. Public Health Service reported that for the third successive week, civilian influenza cases had declined from a peak of 148,688 in the week ended Dec. 15.

Early in the fall, the Army began vaccinating 7,000,000 men with a war-developed vaccine made from killed viruses of influenza "A" and "B," the two most common types.

Officers said reports so far show that "the incidence has been lower than what we might ordinarily have expected during an outbreak."

In tests conducted before the mass vaccination, the new material reduced the incidence of flu about 75 per cent among those vaccinated with it, as compared with unvaccinated persons.

The U. S. Public Health Service announced that the number of cases reported throughout the nation for the week ended Jan. 5 had dropped to 47,273.

"The indications are," declared an official of the health service who asked anonymity, "that both the incidence and mortality of the disease in the current outbreak are on the decline."

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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NEW ENLISTMENT ACT

1. Enlistments for 1, 2 or 3 years. (1-year enlistments permitted for men now in Army with at least 6 months' service.)
2. Enlistment age from 17 to 34 years inclusive, except for men now in the Army, who may enlist at any age, and for former service men, depending on length of service.
3. The best pay scale, medical care, food, quarters and clothing of any army.
4. Recruitment bonus increased to \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service.
5. A paid furlough (up to 90 days depending on length of service) with furlough travel paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who reenlist.
6. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men discharged to reenlist.
7. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master Sergeant up to \$155.25 per month for life.) All active federal military service counts toward retirement.
8. Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights.
9. Family allowances for the term of enlistment for dependents of men who enlist or reenlist before July 1, 1946.
10. Opportunity to learn one or more of 200 skills and trades taught in Army schools in U. S. or occupied countries.
11. Choice of branch of service and overseas theater in the Air, Ground or Service Forces on 3-year enlistments.

MEN NOW IN THE ARMY who reenlist before February 1 will be reenlisted in their present grade. Men honorably discharged can reenlist within 20 days after discharge in the grade they held at the time of discharge, provided they reenlist before February 1, 1946.

The wrinkling feature was achieved, he said, by special methods he employed to "cure" the plastic material by heating. The material he employs, Goldman declared, is a composite of various resinous substances used in dentistry—the basic material being acrylic resin.
