Clarification Of Discharge Policy Asked

American Troops Make Demand on Patterson as He Arrives in Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Jan. 15.—(AP)—A thousand American soldiers met U. S. Secretary of War Patterson as he stepped from his airplane here yesterday and demanded from him a clear-cut policy on Army discharges.

Pfc. David M. Miller, Guilford, Miss., school teacher, who has 28 discharge points to his credit, presented the G.I. petition to Patterson immediately after the secretary had been greeted by Lt. Gen. Albert Wedemeyer, commander of U. S. forces in China.

There were indications that Patterson would confer with the soldiers' committee at an open meeting sometime today.

Patterson arrived from Korea. He plans to remain only a couple of days before continuing to Manila, where other soldier demonstrations against the demobilization slowdown have been held.

Orderliness Asked
Wedemeyer mingled freely with the soldiers, discussing their "gripes" with them and assured them over a public address system that he was not worried about any possible disorderliness.

"I know you will conduct yourselves in an orderly manner," he said. "The eyes of various other nations—the Russians, British and French—are watching what we are doing here in China."

Col. Marshall Stover of Manhattan, Kans., said he would sum up the general feeling this way: "We want a definite policy on discharge. Most of us have more than three years of service and understand that guys with much less time are being released at home. Discharge is Patterson's baby. He's the man we have to see because he formulates policies on discharge. The G.I.'s feel that he can do us the most good and we want him to hear our gripes."

Chinese Demons'trate
Chinese students who shouted "Why don't you go home?" to American troops demonstrated in Shanghai streets today for establishment of a democratic China and withdrawal of United States forces.

Leaders of the several thousand students, who marched through the streets, said the demonstration was part of a nationwide movement. The demonstrators waved placards and banners, and shouted their slogans for American withdrawal and democracy in both Chinese and English.

At a later mass meeting speakers urged a coalition government be formed to provide "freedom of speech and assembly" and demanded the removal of corrupt officials and prompt trial for Chinese traitors. Later, in a protest against French insistence on extrajudicial rights, although Britain and the United States have given up theirs, 3,000 students carrying banners and shouting slogans paraded before the French consulate.

Ouster of Patterson Demanded by American Soldiers in Europe

PARIS, Jan. 15.—(AP)—About 500 American soldiers, adopting the slogan, "We're in—help us out," and demanding the ouster of Secretary of War Patterson, are urging the reduction of officers' privileges in the hope of making voluntary enlistment more attractive.

The group formed a "committee of liberation," at a meeting Sunday. Its chairman, Sgt. Raymond O. Redmond of Corpus Christi, Tex., declared that if men were attracted to Army service it would clear the way for deployment of soldiers eligible for discharge.

Some of the specific demands of the committee were opening

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of all officers' clubs to officers and men alike, abolition of separate officers' messes and special officers' sections at recreational events; require all officers to serve at least one year as enlisted men except in time of war, and inclusion of enlisted men on Army boards of courts martial.

reportedly being prepared by government officials might provide the basis for a wage hike to a total of possibly 131 cents.

Nine smaller packing houses, employing 4,000, agreed to hike wages 15 cents an hour but a strike, if called, would hit 139 plants of the major packers. The strike threat was felt in stock yards as supplies fell off sharply.

Auto Parley Will Resume

In Detroit, the CIO United Auto Workers Union prepared to resume negotiations with the Ford Motor Co., and it was ready to offer the 17 1/2 per cent wage increase recommended by the General Motors fact-finding board as a means of breaking its wage deadlock.

Last month the union selected Ford's 12 1/2 per cent pay boost. General Motors has described the panel's recommendations "unacceptable in whole or in part." GM held to its offer of about 11 per cent.

Operations in the steel industry, against which a strike of 800,000 was delayed until mid-night Sunday, moved toward normal although nearly 30,000 steelworkers were idle and one new walkout was reported.

The biggest pre-deadline strike was at the Bethlehem plant at Lackawanna, N. Y., with 11,000 idle since last Friday. Local issues were involved in the strike there and at other plants where workers left their jobs ahead of the scheduled strike-hour.

President Truman is to talk with union and management officials tomorrow in an effort to settle the dispute over the demands of the CIO United Steelworkers for a \$1.56 a day wage increase. The industry has offered \$1.20.

County Court Members To Attend Land Meet

The Douglas County Court members will go to Portland Thursday for a meeting of the O. & C. counties to consider proposed legislation for a protection of forest lands. Judge D. N. Busenbark said today. The measures under discussion are to be introduced in Congress by Sen. Guy Cordon, Judge Busenbark said. The judges and county commissioners J. Ross Hutchinson and H. B. Rodman expect to return here Friday night.
