River Gives Up Boy's Body

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 14.—(AP)—The body of 8-year-old John Porter Mitchell, one of the four members of the John Mitchell family of Portland who drowned in the recent flood, has been recovered, Coroner Bartholomew said today.

Mrs. Mitchell's body was recovered earlier. Still missing are the bodies of Mitchell and their 4-year-old daughter, Brenda.

Loan Firm to Build

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 14.—(AP)—A 12-story half-block-square office building will be erected here by the Equitable Savings and Loan Association at a cost of \$1,500,000, the company reported today.

It will be the largest building constructed here in 19 years.

Law Office Will Be Opened Here by Lt. H. R. Winston

Lt. Harrison R. Winston, who recently piloted a B-24 Liberator bomber from Okinawa to Mather Field, Calif., has opened a law office in the Pacific Building here. Before he entered the Army, Lt. Winston practiced law for more than four years in Corvallis. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon, class of 1938, a member of the Oregon State Bar Association, and is licensed to practice in federal courts.

His Army experience includes combat flying over a wide area of the Southwestern Pacific, from missions over Rabaul in New Britain, to raids over the Netherlands East Indies, China and the Philippines. Lt. Winston flew the Fifth Air Force's first mission over Japan, taking war correspondents and photographers over Nagasaki, Hiroshima and Tokyo. He later flew out British and American prisoners of war from Okinawa to Clark Field in the Philippines. Then he closed his flying career by piloting his big, war-scarred bomber home from Okinawa to the United States by way of the Philippines, Guam, Kwajalein Atoll, Hawaii and Sacramento.

Court Duty Performed
In addition to his combat flying, Lt. Winston successfully defended many soldiers before U. S. Army general courts, including the securing of an acquittal in the defense of a soldier charged with murder. For participation in nine battle campaigns, Lt. Winston holds the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with a silver and four bronze stars, the Air Medal with an oak leaf cluster, the Philippine Liberation Medal, and the American Theater ribbon. He is on terminal leave, at present, from the Portland Army Air Base.

Lt. Winston and his wife, the former Dorothy Frear, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Frear, Roseburg, are now residing temporarily with Mrs. Winston's parents.

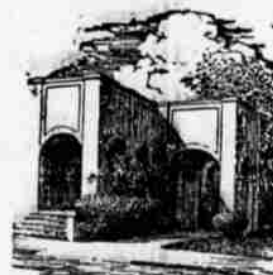
