THERE are true troubles in China. The shooting was supposed to stop at midnight Sunday, but on Monday morning both sides claim it still GOES ON.

THERE is a LOCKOUT in Argentina. The MILITARY government orders wage increases and year-end bonuses for workers, and business leaders order a 72-hour shutdown in protest.

Opponents of Colonel Juan Peron, candidate for president in Argentina's election next month, say the government decree is chiefly for HIS benefit and is an open bid for labor votes for him.

WE'RE fully justified in being suspicious of ANY kind of labor legislation that is dictated wholly by politics.

THERE is a fuzzy slant in this Argentine news.

GAMBLERS are said to have abandoned the government-operated casino at Mar del Plata in such numbers that the place closed down. The gamblers then formed an "L" for LIBERTY.

It sounds like lousy reporting, but we must remember that censorship in Argentina is rigid.

ON THE home front, congress is assembling for an election-year session — which happens every even-numbered year.

A cautious AP reporter says: "Hence political considerations will dictate MANY congressional actions."

That's putting it conservatively. The unwholesome truth is that political considerations will dictate ALL of the actions of this congress.

WE MIGHT as well add, if we are to be completely candid in our thinking, that political considerations will likewise dictate all of President Truman's actions in this highly political year.

THAT is the way democracy works. It is probably the way it should work. One can't help thinking, however, that it would be nice if we could have a sort of sabbatical year in which statesmanship rather than politics would be the controlling principle.

Transfer of Mr. and Mrs. E. K. Peterson from Roseburg to Medford will be a distinct loss to this community. Mr. Peterson, O. and C. supervisor, has been very active in civic affairs.

The work of his wife, Aileen Peterson, in setting up the Roseburg Recreation Program, has been a most important contribution to civic welfare. Mrs. Peterson took charge of a project for which there was no local precedent; a program involving difficult complications because of cooperative local and federal sponsorship.

The Recreational Program was set up jointly by the municipality and federal government under a congressional act making funds available for communities suddenly expanded by war workers.

Placed vacated by Mr. and Mrs. Peterson will be filled by capable and experienced people. Activities in which they have participated probably will not be affected.

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A Good Place for a Good Venture

A proposal has been submitted to the Veterans Administration that groups of disabled veterans be formed into cooperative poultry producers. The plan would be to take over abandoned army training camps, transform barracks into chicken houses, utilize officers' quarters as domiciliary facilities for personnel, etc.

Here, we believe, is a project deserving of serious consideration. One of the chief drawbacks is that the locality best adapted to poultry production has no abandoned army camps. Of course, we refer to the Umpqua Valley.

Our suggestion would be that if the success of this project is to be definitely assured, it should be set up originally in the Umpqua Valley, even to the extent of moving in abandoned barracks, or, better yet, building properly designed and thoroughly modern poultry plants.

Anti-Rescue Edict Issued to German Navy is Disclosed

BRUNSWICK, Germany, Jan. 16.—(AP)—British war crime investigators announced yesterday the completion of an inquiry into the crimes of the Nazis' most revolting crimes—the methodical murder on two "baby farms" of 462 infants.

Sixteen men and three women have been arrested for trial. The investigators said the children were judged under Nazi policy to have been born illegitimately to slave laborers working on farms and in the Volkswagon (German jeep) factory near Brunswick.

Earlier, evidence was introduced which disclosed that Adolf Hitler, in an effort to render American shipping construction useless by creating a shortage of early in 1942 to kill or capture crews of torpedoed vessels.

British prosecutors produced also a secret wireless message to the L-boat commander who reported giving aid to women and children who survived a sinking. The message informed him that this action was "wrong" and bluntly reminded him his vessel was not sent to rescue "English and Poles."

Forest Protection Program Changes Asked by Counties

SALEM, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Revision of the administration of forest protection in Oregon, classification of forest lands by counties, and state acquisition of forest lands where establishment of tree farms is not feasible, are included in a series of resolutions received by the state forestry department here Monday from the Oregon Counties Association.

Particular opposition was voiced against the present method of appointment to the State Board of Forestry through recommendations of various organizations. This was said to result in confusion in carrying out the state forestry program.

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Reduction in stock on the national forests also was protested. "The association protests against any further reductions except in cases where such reductions are in conformity with the facts as to the carrying capacity of the particular locality," another resolution read.
