conducted by the department on what it describes as dairy industry proposals to raise producer prices of fluid milk when the government's \$525,000,000-a-year dairy production subsidy program is ended. Stabilization Director John C. Collet, to whom Anderson carried his bitter fight, announced in November that the dairy subsidy program would be discontinued by June 30. Dairymen want their prices increased by the amount they would lose through termination of the subsidy program which was begun during the war to spur greater production of milk without increasing retail prices.

Boost Long Way Off
The Agriculture Department has authority to fix dairymen's prices in large-city milk marketing areas operating under a federal milk order, provided such prices are approved by two-thirds of the dairymen supplying the market. Any increase, however, may be months away because since Collet's announcement there have been reports that President Truman may ask Congress to continue the entire food subsidy program another year. If such an extension should be granted, the price rise would be delayed.

Salem, Ore., Jan. 17—(AP)—Oregon Motor Stages and Pacific Trails will ask Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg next Monday to hold a hearing on the new low rates ordered into effect for the Pacific Greyhound bus system. The two companies oppose the lower rates, asserting they can't compete with them. The new rates vary from 1.25 to 1.5 cents a mile.

Bombing Marks End of Argentine Business Lockout

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 17—(AP)—A bomb exploded at the entrance of the Stock Exchange today two hours after the end of the 72-hour nationwide lockout by which business leaders protested a military government decree raising wages and granting year-end bonuses.

The Exchange is the meeting place of the permanent Assembly of Commerce, Industry and Production which called the lockout. The blast shattered glass windows within a radius of a block. A policeman was slightly injured by flying casualty, but he was the only casualty.

At Mar Del Plata, a resort vacationers refused to play roulette at government-operated tables. Police fired tear gas into the crowd as it left the casino.

the SA and Gestapo "awakens some objection" but warned: Organizations Share Blame
"Without the existence of these organizations, without the spirit which animated them, one would not succeed in understanding how so many atrocities could have been perpetrated. The systematic war of criminality could not have been carried out by Nazi Germany without these organizations and without the men who composed them."
"The major Nazi culprits had their orders carried out in diverse Nazi organizations which we ask you to declare criminal in order that each of their members may be apprehended and punished."
Nazi Horrors Listed
His accusation ran the gamut of German crimes. He said out of 250,000 persons deported from France, only 35,000 returned.
"At one concentration camp, the most beautiful women were set apart, artificially fertilized and then gassed," he declared.
De Menthon said his country was acting as spokesman for the martyred peace-loving peoples of Western Europe—Norway, Denmark, The Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg.

toxicated by Nazism; certain of their eternal and deep-seated aspirations under the Hitler regime have found monstrous expressions; their entire responsibility is involved not only by their general acceptance but by the effective participation of a great number of them.
The Americans and British completed their cases yesterday, except for those against some individual defendants—including Rudolf Hess and Franz von Papen—which probably will be sandwiched in later. The French case is expected to take about three weeks, after which the Russian prosecutors will take over.
