

Housing Units For Veterans Facility Personnel Sought

Urging the immediate transfer of 100 housing units to Roseburg, members of Umpqua Post, No. 16, American Legion, promised to "exert every influence" to see

that housing is provided recently added personnel at the Roseburg Veterans Facility, in a resolution passed this week. The resolution follows:

Whereas, recent changes in the policy of the Veterans Administration have greatly increased the staffs of Veterans Administration Hospitals; and

Whereas, the Roseburg Veterans Hospital will have an increase of some 60 members, including nine physicians, 21 ad-

ministrative assistants, and 30 hospital attendants; and

Whereas, the housing facilities of this area are insufficient for the present population; and

Whereas, it will be for the benefit of our comrades in the Roseburg Veterans Hospital that the staff increase is made; now therefore

Be it hereby resolved by Umpqua Post, No. 16, The American Legion, Department of Oregon, in regular session assembled this 15th day of January, 1946, at Roseburg, Oregon, that we exert every influence to provide housing for the increased personnel at the Roseburg Veterans Facility, and for our returning comrades of World War II.

That we urge the immediate transfer of 100 housing units to the Roseburg area, for emergency housing for the use of veterans and their families, only, and

That we give public support to these measures through the press, congressmen and senators, and use every individual effort to the early completion of this project.

That the extreme emergency of this problem shall have immediate action.

Clothing of Slain Man, Another Found On River Bushes

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Clothes of two missing Kelo, Wash., men were found yesterday caught on bushes of the Luckiamute River, near the spot where one of the men was reported dumped after a fatal "ride."

State police spotted a leather coat and blanket belonging to Ernest Bowman, 45, Kelo logger whom S. D. McClain, ex-convict, admitted shooting in a signed confession. McClain, 67, and Jack Mann, 27, are held here on burglary charges.

Hanging on the same bushes was an overcoat, which state police identified as the property of Frank Anderson, a Kelo logging camp cook who disappeared Nov. 19.

State policemen Clark Johnson and Bernard Shimondie said the clothing's location checked with the story told last month by McClain and Mann, who said Bowman's body was dumped in one stream Dec. 18 and clothing in another.

Police have been vainly dragging the nearby St. Mary's River for Bowman's body.

Dog-gone Good Riddance

She was en route to a relative's farm to bury a dead dog which she was carrying in the bag.

Umpqua Plywood Plant to be Run On Co-Op Pattern

Key men employed in the plant of the Umpqua Plywood Corporation, Roseburg, which has set its grand opening for March 4, are stockholders in the company, following a co-operative pattern similar to that of the plywood industry in Washington State, Jackson Beaman, secretary of Umpqua Plywood, said today.

All the key men have an interest in the business, Beaman said, but not all of the 125,000 stockholders are employed in the plant. Success of co-operatives and semi-cooperatives in Washington and the Willamette Valley inspired the organizers of the Umpqua Plywood to follow a similar plan in their sale of stock.

The original 20 common stockholders, Beaman said, sold shares of participating preferred stock in blocks of five or 10. Shares were \$100 each. Purchase of stock doesn't guarantee a job, but it gives preference, according to Beaman.

Beaman and Loren Haugen, president of the company, and

eight others in the company, were with the Peninsula Plywood Company at Port Angeles, Wash., before coming to Roseburg to organize their new venture. The Peninsula Company was a "co-operative" organization, too.

Monopoly of Rye Grass Credited to Oregon

PORTLAND, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Oregon's seed business extends to every state and is a virtual monopoly on rye grass, E. R. Jackman, Oregon State College farm crops extension specialist, said yesterday.

Speaking at a meeting of the Oregon Seed Growers League, Jackman said the state's rye

grass seed was used in every give winter pasture, provide hay state and served to anchor soil and nurse more tender grasses.
