The Rose P.T.A. will sponsor an all-day rummage sale Saturday, January 19, at the Episcopal parish house on East Cass Street.

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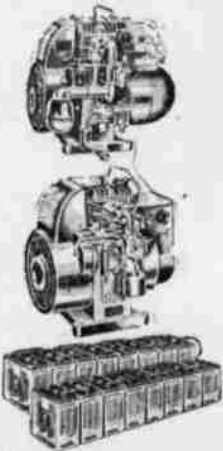
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
