

New Bulletin on Subclover Gives Growers Advice

The first printed bulletin on subterranean clover—now more conventionally called subclover—to be issued by the O.S.C. experiment station is off the press. Written by H. H. Rampton, asso-

ciate federal agronomist stationed at Corvallis, the bulletin gives some of the history of this promising forage legume and cultural suggestions for its use in Oregon.

Rampton explains that subclover is adapted to climates having relatively warm, moist winters and dry summers, hence in Oregon it is adapted to the part of the state west of the Cascades. Well established subclover seedlings can survive temperatures as low as 10 degrees below zero, however, Rampton states.

This clover is naturally suited for growth in combination with grasses which give winter protection to the seedlings. The clover in turn stimulates the growth of the grass because of its soil improving qualities.

Not until 1937 did the plant attract wide attention when better adapted strains revealed superior possibilities. The plant is proving of particular value on lands that are too dry or too low in fertility for white clover.

Subclover, an annual that persists like a perennial, gets its name from the fact that it buries developing seed heads in the soil or puts them directly on top of the ground underneath the vegetative mat.

Mystery Murder Of 3 U. S. Army Officers Probed

BAD TOLEZ, Germany, Jan. 18.—(AP)—U. S. Third Army intelligence headquarters said tonight that no American officers were implicated in the mystery murder of three American military government officers at Passau.

Col. E. M. Fickett, intelligence chief of the Third Army, said also that the murder weapon still was missing.

A Hungarian girl employed in the office of one of the victims has been questioned in an attempt to shed light on a possible motive for the killings, an unofficial source said.

U. S. Army intelligence agents admitted officially for the first time that the three officers, found battered and burned to death in a house on the Danube 11 days ago, had been slain.

A spokesman for the intelligence section of the Third Army made this statement, but the case otherwise remained classified as "top secret."

The victims were Maj. Everett S. Coffey of Washington, D. C.; Capt. Adrian I. Wesseler of New Rochelle, N. Y.; and Lt. Stanley Rosewater of Omaha, Neb. Coffey, an officer of the Passau military administration, had the oth-
