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be accepted.

3. A plea that he acted under orders shall not of itself be sufficient to free a defendant.

The charter provided that the first trial would be held in Tokyo. It has been scheduled tentatively for early March.

MacArthur Has Last Say

"A sentence will be carried out in accordance with the order of the supreme commander for the Allied powers, who may at any time reduce or otherwise alter the sentence, except that he may not increase its severity, the charter noted.

The tribunal membership will be appointed by MacArthur from names submitted by the Allied Nations.

"All decisions and judgments of this tribunal, including convictions and sentences, shall be by a majority vote of those members of the tribunal present," the charter explained. (No individual members have thus far been named, and Russia has given no indication whether she will name anyone.)

MacArthur's orders made it clear that other tribunals also may be set up "in Japan or in any territory of the United Nations for trial of war criminals."

Crimes Are Listed

The charter listed these crimes for which Japanese are to be tried.

1. Crimes against peace—"The planning, preparation, initiation or waging of declared or undeclared war of aggression, or war in violation of international law." (Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor came before she formerly declared war on the Allies.)

2. Conventional war crimes—"Violations of the laws and customs of war."

3. Crimes against humanity—"Murder, extermination, enslavement, deportation and other inhuman acts committed against any civilian population before or during war."

"Neither the official position of an accused, nor the fact that an accused acted pursuant to an order of his government or of a superior shall of itself be sufficient to free such accused from responsibility from any crime with which he may be charged," the charter said. Such circumstances may be considered, however, in mitigation of punishment.

Steel Factories Closing; Kaiser Increases Wages

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CIO President Philip Murray, was rejected by Benjamin F. Fairless, U. S. Steel Corp. president.

Murray Praises Kaiser

The strike, originally scheduled to begin Jan. 14, "must take place," said Murray, indicating that the 750,000 members of the CIO United Steelworkers Union which he heads will remain away from their jobs in 1,300 steel, aluminum and fabricating plants.

Murray said the Kaiser contract terminates next Oct. 16. He added that "the nation owes a debt of gratitude to Mr. Kaiser."

"Mr. Kaiser," Murray said, "as a great American has made a contribution to the nation."

Murray reported that President Truman "seemed to be delighted" with the agreement.

Fair Play Advocated

"I have signed this agreement," Kaiser said, "because I am confident that only by integrity and fair play on the part of both labor and management can we ride the perilous seas ahead and achieve industrial harmony and security for our people."

He added that he could not "conceive that a sum of three and a half cents (the difference between the U. S. Steel's offer and the President's 18 cents proposal) should be permitted to retard or destroy the possibility of real peace and prosperity for the nation."

The agreement signed today, Kaiser said, covers "the operation of the largest steel plant on the Pacific coast." His Fontana,

Calif., operations employ approximately 3,000 to 4,000, he said.

Thus, as a paralyzing strike hits the nation's steel mills Monday, Kaiser's plants will continue turning out steel.

There appeared no White House plans to stop the walkout and government seizure of the plants was not contemplated.

The 750,000 steelworkers, plus an undetermined number of workers in other industries whose work will be affected by the walkout, will join some 880,000 men and women already idle in scores of industries because of labor disputes.

As the steel strike-hour neared, there were no immediate indications that other top-ranking disputes were near settlement.

No Progress Elsewhere

The paralyzing strike of some 263,000 CIO and AFL workers in the meat industry continued for the fourth day as meat supplies across the country became more scarce. Federal conciliators kept on trying to effect an agreement between the unions and packers in their wage dispute while a fact-finding board was to open public hearings in Chicago Tuesday.

In another huge strike, involving 200,000 electrical workers against General Electric, Westinghouse and General Motors, there likewise was no progress reported. The walkout started Tuesday after a breakdown in wage negotiations.

Steel Rationing Planned

As the steel strike neared, the civilian production administration in Washington said that in event of a general walkout, a program of voluntary rationing of steel supplies would be put into effect. This would protect "essential needs" such as emergency repairs and maintenance required by hospitals, transportation, public utilities, food processing, police and fire departments and public health and safety.

Eugene Axemen Defeat Roseburg, Gain League Top

Eugene High School's Axemen defeated the Roseburg Indians, 35 to 27, in a basketball game in Eugene Friday night, taking control of first place in league play.

The two teams previously were undefeated in conference play and were tied for top spot.

The Axemen commanded the game from start to finish, although the Indians narrowed the lead to two and four points.

Roseburg players had difficulty in locating the basket on the large Eugene floor and missed a larger percentage of their shots than in previous games.

Rendall Young, Roseburg's star forward, was high point man with 16 tallies. Lovelace and Wilde were tied with 10 each for Eugene.

Eugene held a lead of 21 to 16 a half-time and 26 to 20 going into the fourth period.

majority of the Senate—with guts enough to hold continuous sessions 24 hours a day. That fight would produce all the votes needed for closure, with the spotlight of American opinion focused on the Senate 24 hours a day.

"We could put cots in the cloak-rooms so members could be on hand at any time to respond to a roll call."

The hotly disputed measure was called up unexpectedly Thursday, and the anti-FEPC group, by a legislative stratagem, began yesterday to correct the official journal of Thursday's Senate proceedings. The bill itself hardly came in for mention.

Reading of the journal took an hour and a half by itself. Then Senator Overton (D-La.) offered his first correction—insertion of the chaplain's prayer.

That was still the unfinished business when the Senate adjourned yesterday afternoon until Monday. Then the debate on correction No. 1 resumes, unless it is interrupted by the reading of the President's combined message on the state of the Union and the budget.

Capt. Fred Kinsel Home After 4 Years' War Duty

Capt. Fred Kinsel, former member of the Roseburg police force, has returned to his home following four years of military service. Son of Mrs. Eva Kinsel, Wilbur, he enlisted in the Army Air Forces in May, 1942. He was a flight instructor and director of training at Arizona fields until late in 1943, when he was assigned to the 3rd Commando group in Florida. In April, 1944, he was transferred to the ATC and flew eight missions across the North Atlantic. Late in 1944 he was transferred to India and made 100 flights between India and China transporting passengers. He wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal and three battle stars. He returned to the States in December, and at Maxwell Field, Montgomery, Ala., was placed on inactive status. He reverts to the Reserve next Feb. 24.

Tommy Moyer Knocks Out Suarez in 8th Round

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Tommy Moyer, 146½, 1941 National Amateur Lightweight Boxing Champion, today held the mythical Oregon State welterweight crown after knocking out Johnny Suarez, 142½, Portland, in the second match of Moyer's professional career. Suarez was leading up to the sixth round and had scored a four-count knockdown in the first.

Moyer knocked out the little Mexican at 2:42 of the eighth stanza with a wicked short left to the chin.

Suarez, who previously scored

a string of eight local wins, held the advantage through the first rounds with a dangerous left. He sent Moyer to the canvas in the first with a right hook to the jaw, and dropped him again momentarily a few seconds later.

Railroad Reservation Limit to Be Revoked

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The Office of Defense Transportation announced yesterday the prohibition against making railroad reservations more than 14 days in advance will be revoked March 15.

ODT said that after March 15 "the railroads will be free to make such arrangements as they please regarding advance reservations."

The order which had placed a 5-day time limit on reservations became effective last June 29.
