## Hungary Oil Field, Owned by Standard, Seized by Russia

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The New York Times said yesterday in a dispatch from Budapest that the Red Army had seized the Hungarian oil fields at Lisse, including the largest which is owned by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey.

The Russians put in their own geologists and barred Standard Oil's general manager from the field several days ago, the dispatch said. The oil from the field is being sent in Standard Oil's pipelines to the company's refineries where it is paid for by the Russians, however.

The dispatch said the Russians explained that American development technique was 25 years behind the times, compared with the practices in Russia where 100 per cent recovery of oil reserves is common.

**Waste is Predicted**  
Standard Oil experts were quoted as saying that by their methods 80 per cent of the oil in the Lisse field might be recovered with care, but that great waste would result from the Russian methods. The Russian action was interpreted as disclosing an intention to exploit the field to the utmost without regard to long-range usefulness of the field, in the expectation that eventually the Russians will be obliged to withdraw their forces from the country.

When the Red Army originally occupied Hungary, the dispatch said, the Russians took over the field and removed much of the equipment. Part of this was restored after a few months, however, and Standard Oil employees were permitted to retake possession and carry on operations.

The dispatch pointed out that American property was exempt from the Hungarian reparations agreement with Russia, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia, and a Potsdam declaration permitted Russia to take only German assets in Hungary.

## Mrs. Mary Moore Passes at Riddle

Mary D. Moore, 82, died Monday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ebert Ball, in Riddle, where she had made her home for the last eight years. She was born Aug. 25, 1863, in Jacksonville, Ky. In 1881 she was married to the late William D. Moore in Booneville, Ky., moving to Oregon in 1885 to take up homesteading at Kellogg, Oregon, and later coming to the Roseburg community to make their home.

She was a member of the Apostolic church.

Surviving are two sons: Dr. C. E. Moore, Grand Rapids, Mich.; William Moore, Tacoma, Wash.; one daughter, Mrs. Lillian Ball, Riddle, and seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

## Oregon Crop Goals For This Year Set

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Crop goals for Oregon in 1946 were set at or above last year's production, but livestock and poultry aims — excepting dairy products — have been reduced, a federal agriculture official announced Monday.

R. B. Taylor, U. S. Department of Agriculture production and marketing administration field service director, said goals were determined after conferences between federal and state agriculture leaders.

Sharpest crop increase was for alfalfa, clover and corn. The goals:

Corn, 50,000 acres, up 25 per cent; oats, 450,000 acres, up 10 per cent; barley, 260,000 acres, up 7 per cent; tame hay, 880,000 acres, up 4 per cent; wheat, 1,000,000 acres, up 3 per cent; rye, 35,000 acres, up 6 per cent.

Cover crops and legume seed, hairy vetch, 55,000 acres, up 5 per cent; Willamette vetch, 70,000 acres; Austrian winter peas, 30,000 acres, up 7 per cent; common rye grass, 80,000 acres, no change; alfalfa, 10,000 acres, up 43 per cent; red clover, 20,000 acres, up 33 per cent; alsike clover, 25,000 acres, up 150 per cent; ladino clover, 10,000 acres, up 61 per cent.

There was no change in acreages for: dry beans, 1,000 acres; sugar beets, 17,000 acres. But potatoes, at 46,000 acres, will drop 16 per cent. No goals were set for canning vegetables, but gardening by individuals and commercial canners is expected to increase.

Milk, 1,445,000,000 pounds (250,000 cows needed); eggs, 37,640,000, down 5 per cent; chickens, 4,251,000, down 2 per cent; turkeys, 2,221,000, a 15 per cent decrease; cattle and calves by Jan. 1, 1,500,000, a 3 per cent decrease, Sows, 30,000 farrowing by spring.

## Share of O. & C. Land Funds Sought For Reforestation

Legislation proposing that 10 per cent of the Oregon and California Land Grant Fund be used for reforestation purposes was approved by members of the county courts of the O. and C. counties last week, and will be introduced in Congress by Sen. Guy Cordon.

The meeting, held in Portland, was attended by Judge D. N. Busenbark and County Commissioners J. Ross Hutchinson and H. B. Roadman.

The bill also provides for fire protection in such amount as Congress appropriates, and the remainder of the fund to be divided, 50 per cent for use by the counties in the same manner as other general county funds; 25 per cent for administrative costs of the O. and C. Administration, and 25 per cent to revert to the Treasury of the United States.

The new bill is an effort on the part of the O. and C. counties to obtain additional funds in lieu of taxes for the reforested lands. Judge Busenbark explained, and is an inducement to Congress to approve the legislation when Senator Cordon introduces it. At present, there is no provision for reforestation by the committee.

The O. and C. Land Grant Fund is built up through timber sales. Commissioners Hutchinson and Roadman are to go to Salem Thursday, to attend a meeting called by the State Board of Forestry. They are going in the interests of the Douglas Protective Association, they said.

**Coos Bay, North Bend Vote Bonds to Buy Utility**  
COOS BAY, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Coos Bay water district voters yesterday approved two bond issues totaling \$675,000 for purchase and rehabilitation of the water system.

A \$400,000 issue for purchase of the People's Water and Gas Company properties was approved 683 to 76. A \$275,000 issue for repairs and improvements was authorized 659 to 78.

The district, controlled by a five-man commission, includes Coos Bay, North Bend and a connecting strip of land between them.

**Oregon Coyotes to Again Be Hunted With Planes**  
PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Airborne hunters will be gunning for coyotes in Oregon again this year.

The State Game Commission said four fliers will go to work on predators in February and March. A reconnaissance flight would be feasible in areas not already included will also be made.

The commission reported wildlife loss to coyotes less than during the past three or four years—but still sufficient to justify the aerial hunting.

## Transportation of Liquor Jails Three At Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 21.—(AP)—Illegal transportation of liquor placed two Negroes and one white man in the county jail under a 15-day sentence with assessed fines of \$150 each Saturday on their pleas of guilty to a charge of violating the state liquor control law. A third Negro was fined \$25 on his plea of guilty to the same charge, but he was not sentenced to jail.

Judge J. R. Mathews, Justice Court, said the liquor, a total of 132 bottles, was confiscated and the jail sentence was imposed to permit officers time to check ownership of a 1942 Packard sedan the men were driving.

The four were arrested by State Police Officer Charles Johnson Friday as they were driving north on Mount Sexton when he stopped them for inspection.

The four men are Nathan Minex, 36, of Louisiana, Willy Hiepins, 32, of San Francisco; George Alvin Andrews, 17, of Vancouver, Wash., all colored; and Jerome Cott Hill, 17, of Independence, Kansas, white.

Andrews was fined only \$25 when the court accepted his story that he had no personal part in the liquor deal and was only riding with the other three.

In addition to the liquor charge, Minex pleaded guilty to a charge of operating a car without a driver's license and was fined \$10.

The men told the court that they had bought the liquor in San Francisco and were taking it to Seattle, from where they would take it overseas for resale. All three were with the Merchant Marine, assigned to the Coast Guard aboard the transport Kate Douglas.
