A letter from International Federation was read, advising that the rehabilitation of the industrial clubs was in progress but very slow due to so many hardships entailed by the war. Every club in the country is being appealed to, to help in every way possible, even to packing individual boxes of clothing and food. It is hard to visualize predicaments such as this one, reported by one of the representatives of the club in Europe, of a proud, capable international officer in another country; she was in desperate need of a pair of walking shoes, to get a new pair was out of the question, it was with a great deal of effort that she purchased an ill-fitting, worn pair, for which she paid the equivalent of 20 American dollars.

By the graduation of a few of these facts, it is brought home how small one's vicissitudes are, comparatively speaking, great as they may seem, in the post-war reorganization. It also brings home the fact that very human beings so fortunate as live in this country should awaken to his or her good fortune and put forth every effort to unify themselves to build up and keep up their country in its admirable state.
