SCHOOLS COST MONEY

Douglas county school districts taxed real property \$220,664 more for the current school year than for the 1944-45 fiscal year, according to a report appearing in Your Taxes, a publication sponsored by Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc.

The item is of much news interest. It relates that higher school costs were reported in 27 counties. In Douglas county, the increase of \$220,664, levied against property, was in addition to \$216,209 boost in income tax funds.

But when we stop to give thought to the reason for mounting school costs, we can take pride in our school system, and the civic enterprise and public cooperation which furnish required financial support.

Protection for Domestic Wool Industry Foreseen

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—A prediction that Congress soon will take steps to protect the domestic wool industry was made by Rep. Barrett (D-Wyo.).

American woolgrowers are faced with ruinous competition from abroad unless some protection is afforded, he told a reporter.

"I think Congress is going to have to settle this problem, and I think it will settle it," he said. Barrett's own solution for the problems facing the industry is to put quota restrictions on wool imports. He pointed out that domestic growers now provide only about one half the wool used in this country, but still can't compete with foreign growers because of higher production costs.

He would set up a board, consisting of officials of the Agriculture, Treasury and State departments, which at the beginning of each year would make an estimate of wool needs and production in this country.

The board would determine how much wool should be brought in to meet demands and apportion the amount among other producing countries on a basis of past imports. "Although the legislation such as I have in mind will chiefly benefit western states, I think



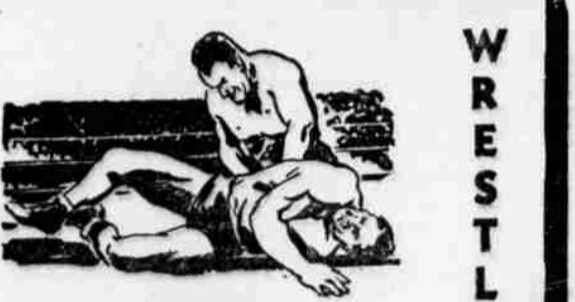
