Staff Expansion Aim of Vets Administration
WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Six hundred social workers are being recruited by the Veterans Administration in a campaign to expand its staff by 850. An announcement by Irene Grant, head of the staff, said the salaries have been increased "to encourage men to apply."
The jobs will pay from \$2,980 for the lowest grade up to \$4,300 for a top grade, at 40 hours a week. For a 48-hour week the top grade pays \$5,092.
The workers will help physicians by counselling war veteran patients on their personal and family problems and gaining other information which doctors find essential for rapid recovery from some types of illnesses.

Dr. Irvin Hill Appointed Head of Fairview Home
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 22.—(AP)—Dr. Irvin Hill of the Oregon State Hospital staff was appointed today by the State Board of Control as superintendent of the Fairview Home, an institution for feeble-minded persons.
Dr. Hill succeeds Dr. Ray M. Waltz, whom the board said has resigned.
The board said it instructed Dr. Hill to improve the institution, which has been understaffed.
Dr. Hill is a graduate of the University of Oregon Medical School, and served on the Fairview Home staff before going on the State Hospital staff.

Evangelist Talks To Kiwanians On Religion's Value

"Religion is my product; I believe in it; I sell it," the Rev. Bron Clifford told Kiwanians yesterday at their weekly luncheon meeting. The youthful evangelist was introduced by the Rev. H. P. Scoone, pastor of the First Baptist Church, where Clifford is conducting an evangelistic mission this week.

"I join with you as a fellow Kiwanian and rejoice in the good work of Kiwanis all over the country," Clifford said, as he began a talk which held his listeners' attention to the end.

Clifford was described by Scoone as the "outstanding evangelistic speaker of a million." He also "turned down a million dollars" when offered the lead in a motion picture based on Lloyd Douglas' "The Robber."

"Since the beginning of history those who have ever said: 'We have the answer to a better world,' and have gone down to defeat, are the ones who have left the worship of a supreme being out of their lives; theirs are the philosophies that have left God out of the picture," Clifford declared, as he scored the forces that have driven rise to Hitler, Mussolini and Hirohito.

"Pennies make the dollar; only as the pennies are strong and sound can the dollar have value; men make the nation; only as men live, and not as counterfeits, can the nation thrive," he said.

Kiwanians observed the 31st anniversary of the founding of the national organization yesterday, by serving slices from a large birthday cake.

Yesterday's program was arranged by Eli S. Hall, principal of Rose School, and was given by Eddie K. Jones, pupil at Rose School.

Captive Girl Nazi Says She's Hitler's Daughter

HERFORD, Germany, Jan. 22.—(AP)—British authorities are holding an attractive 18-year-old girl, Gotelind Tortensen, who asserts that Hitler was her father.

During numerous interrogations since her arrest in the Magdeburg area, she has insisted that her mother was a Swedish actress, who was Hitler's mistress in the late 1920's.

She said her mother and Hitler met frequently in Vienna and that her mother now is dead.

The girl is an ardent Nazi with a violent hatred for Americans and British. She is being held in an internment camp near Paderborn as a security suspect.
