

Counties Advised To Hire Full-Time Purchasing Agents

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Oregon counties were advised yesterday to employ full-time purchasing agents to represent all municipalities, school districts and other governmental subdivisions within their borders to take full advantage of government surplus properties.

J. V. Rogers, Wenatchee, president of the Association of Washington cities, made the proposal at a meeting of the League of Oregon Cities and the Oregon Finance Officers Association.

Logger Killed In Northern Douglas

Ernest Earl Tatro, 42, was killed Tuesday, Jan. 22, as a result of a logging accident in Northern Douglas county. He was employed by Arlo Thomas, logging contractor of Drain, and was working in timber on the Smith River road. He was born in Chelsea, Oklahoma, Sept. 27, 1903, and has been a resident of the Curtin vicinity for the last 3 years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Esther Tatro; three daughters, Mrs. Maggie L. Cloud, Bertha M., Alberta A. and four sons, Gerald, Derral S., John L. and Albert Tatro, all of Curtin. His father, Linnis L. Tatro, and a sister, Mrs. Ella Robinson, Ben Davis, Mo. He was married to Miss Esther Billings at Sapulpa, Okla., on June 20, 1925, and was a member of the Baptist church. Services will be

held in the Christian church, Drain, tomorrow at 2 P. M. and interment will be in the Comstock cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Heroic Chaplain Gets Top Award

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The first chaplain in the armed forces to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor was praised yesterday by President Truman as having done his "duty to God and man."

Comdr. Joseph T. O'Callahan of Cambridge, Mass., who was on the aircraft carrier Franklin when she was hit by Japanese bombs, was said by both Navy and the Army to be the first chaplain to be given the highest military award of the nation.

Father O'Callahan, first Jesuit priest to enter the Naval service in World War II, was decorated at a White House ceremony.

Father O'Callahan was cited for gallantry at the risk of his life, above and beyond the call of duty, when the Franklin was damaged March 19, 1945.

"A valiant and forceful leader, calmly braving the perilous barriers of plane and twisted steel to aid his men and ship," the citation said, he "groped his way through smoke-filled corridors to the open flight deck and into the midst of violently exploding bombs, shells, rockets and other armament."

He ministered to the wounded and dying, comforting men of all faiths in serving with "courage, fortitude and deep spiritual strength" the citation continued.
