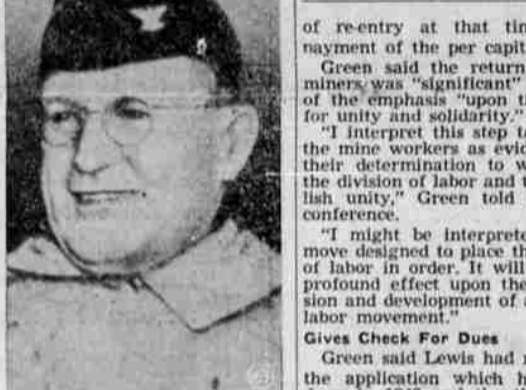

Wharf Permit On Umpqua Sought

Application has been made to the U. S. Engineers in Portland by John T. Branson, Reedsport, for a permit to construct a wharf and to drive two 3-pile dolphins on the south bank of the Umpqua river approximately 11 miles upstream from Reedsport, according to announcement by Col. G. J. Zimmerman, district engineer.

The proposed wharf is to be of pile and timber construction, 100 feet in length parallel to the shore line, 28 feet in width, and will extend into the waterway approximately 28 feet from the highwater line. The two 3-pile dolphins are to be driven at the upstream end of the wharf.

Maps of the exact location and extent of the proposed wharf may be seen at the U. S. Engineers office in Portland. Any objections from the standpoint of navigation or otherwise should be sent to the U. S. Engineers not later than February 2, Col. Zimmerman stated.

Three Agricultural Posts Quit by Taylor

PORTLAND, Jan. 25 — (AP) — Robert B. Taylor announced a triple resignation from state agricultural positions today to return to his farm at Adams. Taylor resigned effective Jan. 31, as chairman of the Oregon state agricultural conservation committee, director of the field service branch of the department of agriculture production and marketing administration, and chairman of the new state USDA council.

Sgt. D. Lincks Last Seen Parachuting Into North Sea

Staff Sergeant Darrell Lincks, husband of Mrs. Maxine O. Lincks, Myrtle Point, who was reported missing after a fight over Germany March 11, 1944, by the War Department, was seen parachuting into the North Sea, according to a letter she received recently from a crew member in the B-17 in which her husband served as waist gunner.

The bomber was flying over the English Channel returning from a mission over Munster, Germany. The plane had been hit by flak, but its operation seemed normal. Suddenly the plane peeled out of formation. Lincks' buddy, S-Sgt. Julius Schultz writes, and started into a deep dive. The plane leveled off, then began to spin. The tail gunner called the pilot over the plane's communication, but received no answer. He crawled into the waist where the other gunners were.

As the plane began to reel and a tip of the wing ripped off, Sergeant Lincks donned his parachute and jumped. Two others followed him. Sgt. Schultz counted two parachutes besides his own. He landed on an island off the coast of Holland and was captured by the Germans. The other two landed in the mine-infested waters of the North Sea and to Schultz' knowledge, were not rescued.

Besides his widow, Sergeant Lincks survived by his mother, Mrs. Floyd Smith, 1150 Corey Street, Roseburg. He was born in Fresno, Calif., Feb. 12, 1918, and graduated from Riddle High School in 1937. He studied aeronautical engineering for two years at Oregon State College. He and Mrs. Lincks made their home in Roseburg prior to his enlistment in December, 1941.

Pay Boosts Mean Higher Prices, Says GMC President

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 — (AP) — President C. E. Wilson of General Motors testified today that "if you want higher wages paid you are going to have to have higher prices."

Wilson, whose vast General Motors plant has been strike-bound for two months, appeared before the Senate Labor Committee. He opposed fact finding, compulsory arbitration, or extension of the wartime presidential powers for government seizure and operation of industry during strikes.

At one point Wilson said that if the country was going to "hold the line on prices then we'll have to worry along with strikes and all take a big loss." He added: "I think we're going to have some awful bad strikes before the men go back to work at the wages at which the men were working before."

Broadcasts Feared By Nazi General

NUERNBERG, Jan. 25 — (AP) — Field Marshal Sigmund Wilhelm List, former commander-in-chief of Army group "A" in the Caucasus, was afraid to listen to foreign broadcasts, he admitted today.

"It was against the Fuehrer's orders and I wouldn't dream of taking the chance, especially since I had a maid whose political convictions were unknown to me," he told Allied intelligence officers. He said Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel fired him after he refused to undertake an "assinine" offensive through the Caucasus passes in order to establish a foothold on the shores of the Black Sea.

Back in civilian life, List said he heard rumors that the high command was to be thrust upon him and he lay awake nights thinking up ways and means of dodging it.
