

Five Scouts Given Rank of Eagle at Reedsport Rites

REEDSPORT—Only one in 1,000 Boy Scouts ever attains the honor of being an Eagle Scout. So it was not only an honor, but a surprising event when, at the Court of Honor in the Legion Hall last week, Scoutmaster H. T. Lewis and his assistant, Vernon Norman, of Reedsport Troop, No. 10, presented not one, but five Scouts for that honor. It was an impressive scene as the five young men lined up before the judges of the court to receive the highest honors ever bestowed on an American Boy Scout.

The boys were Nelson Durban, Jerry Clark, Jim Smith, Billie Bond, and Willard Raymond.

As the name of each lad was called, and he answered "Here!" his mother was escorted to the platform by Scout escorts and had the honor of pinning to the blouse of her son the badge of an Eagle Scout, and in turn, each son pinned upon the breast of his mother a miniature of the pin which he himself had received.

There were certainly five proud mothers, five proud Boy Scouts and somewhere lost in the crowd five equally proud fathers who, on this occasion, had been relegated to the background.

Present at this meeting and acting as court judges were Roger Bayles, Eugene, Scout executive; Judge Conington, Eugene, assistant Scout executive; Ernest Seaton, Coos Bay, Scout executive, and Leonard Mayfield, Coos Bay, chairman, board of review.

Inferno of Future Atom War, Possible Accidental Blast Envisaged by British General

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—The nightmare of an atomic war of annihilation exploding accidentally from a defective bomb fuse or a maniac's thumb jabbing a fatal button was conjured up yesterday by Major Gen. J. F. C. Fuller.

The British military analyst likened the atomic weapon to a sword of Damocles suspended over the world's head.

"The slender thread holding that sword might be cut 'wiffully' in event of another war, he said, 'but on account of the tension in which all nations will live, it is far more likely to be severed accidentally.' Then he mentioned bad fuses on atomic rockets and maniacs who might gain access to control panels as instruments of such disaster.

Future Alert Envisaged

Writing in the service magazine, Army Ordnance, Fuller gave his conception of the outbreak of an atomic war.

"Instead of cities being walled in as in the Viking age, we can picture whole countries girt about by radar sets, ceaselessly 'listening in' for the first note of the broadcast of annihilation.

"In the vicinity of these instruments will be hidden away two tactical organizations of atmosphere and propelled rockets—the one offensive and the other defensive. The first will be ranged on every great foreign city in the world, because before war is launched (to declare it

Madrid Still in Throes of Gossip Over Goya Paintings After Lapse of Hundred Years

MADRID, Jan. 23.—(AP)—It is an astonishing thing that the loves and hates and irreverence and escapades of a man who died more than 100 years ago still should provide choice morsels for active gossip in Madrid, and yet that is exactly what is happening in the case of the immortal Spanish painter, Francisco Goya.

In fact, there never has been a time since Goya first achieved notice as an artist when this extraordinary personality—alive or dead—hasn't been in the limelight. And if you want proof of present interest just join in cafe conversations, or go to the Prado Museum which houses so many of his works and see the crowd that flocks to study his art, especially the scandalous paintings and etchings which he did with tongue in cheek while his victims tore their hair.

The latest incident to set gossip humming afresh has been the exhumation of the body of the fourteenth Duchess of Alba, the famous Spanish court beauty who died mysteriously in 1892. This exhumation was ordered by the present duke to determine two moot questions—whether the duchess died of poison and whether she was the model used by Goya for his painting "A Madrid Nude" which hangs in the Prado.

Rumored

The duchess and the artist were

1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
3 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 cup milk
