Zoning, Planning By Cities Topics Of Talk by Croft

His impressions of the recent League of Oregon Cities meeting in Portland were told members of the Kiwanis Club yesterday, by City Councilman Percy Croft, who addressed the weekly luncheon meeting in the Umpqua Hotel.

As a "lone wolf" from Roseburg, Croft was not able to attend all the discussions on various phases of city government. His chief interest lay in city planning and zoning. So County Auditor A. B. Collier, who also attended the gathering, listened in on the tax discussions.

Of such matters that are vital to Roseburg, as traffic and parking, and city zoning, Croft told his listeners how other cities have dealt with these problems. He also said that other cities have learned that the "home-town boy" cannot successfully plan the re-zoning of a city and at the same time soothe those whose interests are directly affected by re-zoning. An outsider who is expert in city planning must be brought in to sell the idea to the local citizens.

Croft spoke also of co-operation with county officials in planning subdivisions adjacent to cities. There must be conformity, he said, in "more than just street widths" in suburban areas close to town. One phase of city-county co-ordination which the councilman mentioned, was the determination by "use maps" of the adaptability of certain businesses to their surroundings, with railroads and trunk highways as factors in location.

Darby has arrived in San Francisco, following two years of service in the South Pacific war area, according to a telephone message received in Roseburg by his mother, Mrs. H. C. Darby. Gale Bishop Paces Cougar Cagers To Victory Over OSC

PULLMAN, Jan. 30.—(P)—Mr. B. hit his stride last night and today you could cover the five galloping entrants in the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball chase with a small flying carpet.

The B. stands for big, bombastic and Bishop, and like the other half of his name—which is Gale—he blew through Oregon State at a 15-point clip last night to pace cellar dwelling Washington State to a 49 to 34 victory, its second of the nearly half-gone season.

Oregon State headed home after one of its most disastrous road trips ever, tied with

Idaho in second place just half a game back of front running Washington. O. S. C. took but one game, that a 50-48 thriller from W. S. C. Monday night, on its four-game swing through the Palouse country.

The Bishop the visiting Beavers had bottled up in his first post-war appearance in W. S. C. livery couldn't be handled so easily last night. His defensive play—he and Teammate Vince Hanson ruled the backboards—ranked with his scoring skill.

Except for a first half flurry when O. S. C. led at 6 to 5 and again at 14-13, it was W. S. C. all the way. By halftime the home town Cougars were in front at 26-22 and they moved steadily away, holding Oregon State to two field goals in the final half.

Both of those were by Red Rocha, O. S. C. center who paced his team with eight points. Ray Johnson had a dozen to back up Bishop and Hanson hit the ring for nine.
