Airliner, 21 Aboard, Crashes in Wyoming

crew of three were aboard the two-engine Douglas transport and of the passengers 12 were Army personnel being re-deployed from the Pacific coast. Among the civilian passengers were Mr. and Mrs. George A. Bender of Sheffield, Ill., who were married Monday at Twin Falls, Idaho.

The plane, which left from

Seattle, cleared Portland on time at 8:15 last night. Its last stop was Boise, Idaho.

The accident, first fatal mishap on United Airlines in almost four years, probably occurred around 3 A. M. (Mountain Standard Time). The flight having made a routine report from over Sinclair, Wyo., a few miles to the west at 2:40 A. M. No trouble was reported from the plane at that time and no bad weather was reported along the route.

Crew From Portland
In charge of the plane was Captain Walter P. Briggs, veteran air line pilot whose home was in Portland, Ore. He was married, Harry M. Atlas, also of Portland, was the first officer and the stewardess was Dorothy Jean Carter of Portland.

Commenting on the accident, J. A. Herlihy, UAL vice president in charge of operations, said: "United Air Lines' world record for safety has been achieved during peak wartime operations which averaged more than 100,000 passenger miles per day since May, 1942 and is currently almost 136,500 mi's daily."

Officials of UAL figured the lines had flown 1,700,000,000 passenger miles since their last previous fatal accident May 1, 1942.

Briggs, pilot of the plane, had been with the company nearly a decade. He was recently discharged from three years' service in the Army as lieutenant-colonel in the Air Transport Command.

The stewardess, Dorothy Carter, 22, daughter of Clarence M. Carter, La Grande, Ore., was employed about a year ago. The co-pilot, Harry N. Atlas, went to Portland two weeks ago after completing his course at the airlines' Denver flight school. His former home was Seattle.
