

Discharge Papers Should Be Kept Safely, Vet Told

The veteran who loses his original discharge papers is apt to suffer a long delay in receiving certain GI benefits. For that reason he should take every precaution to see that they are kept in a safe place and are available at all times, Hugh E. Rosson, director of the state department of veterans' affairs, warned today.

When a veteran applies for and receives his first \$50 check for unemployment under the readjustment allowance, he must take his discharge with him to be stamped by the unemployment compensation commission in the U. S. employment service office where he receives his claim. This stamp gives the date and the place where he first made application.

Recent information discloses that the veteran's discharge also must be stamped to show the amount and the type of government guaranty used during the GI loan bill, and the amount, if any, remaining.

Copy Won't Suffice
In neither case will a photostatic or certified copy of the man's discharge papers serve.

The government makes this procedure necessary to prevent a veteran from receiving more than the total benefits allowed him. Otherwise, as veterans' representatives explain, a man could use up his benefits in Oregon, for example, then go to another state and start all over again, merely by getting another certified or photostatic discharge copy.

Once the original discharge is lost, the veteran must apply for a certificate in lieu of his discharge. Government officials have repeatedly warned that a great deal of time is involved in issuing this certificate.

Youth Center At Sutherlin Aim of Scouts' Parents

Also discussed at the meeting is the need for sponsors for various scout groups. It was suggested that contact be made with the VFW and Auxiliary for the senior boy and girls troops; the American Legion and Auxiliary for intermediate groups, and the P. T. C. for the Brownie groups. New leaders are also an urgent need. Mrs. E. M. Patton and Mrs. Harold Hatcher were suggested as possible volunteers.

A Court of Honor for all troops will be held February 19 at 8 P. M. Refreshments will be served.

The Boy and Girl Scout troops

will participate in the March of Dimes dance sponsored by the Sutherlin Parent-Teachers Club February 2. They will present an exhibition Colonial number in costume.

Sugar Daddy Role Of Uncle Sam Is Scored by Landon

TOPEKA, Kans., Jan. 30.—(AP)—Alf M. Landon, 1936 Republican presidential nominee and former Kansas governor, yesterday called for an end to the "siren song" that government is a Sugar Daddy, able to shell out money endlessly.

"Stop the New Deal policy of borrowing and borrowing—spending and spending—giving and giving," Landon urged in a speech before the Kansas day women's Republican club.

"Our national government can-

not possibly carry the financial burden of the world on its shoulders—and continue to give a living to those unwilling to do an honest day's work. All issues in the end relate to a balanced budget and to economy and efficiency in government."

Mismanagement of its international relations, Landon declared, brought the United States to the place where it is "vital to America to keep the British Empire a going concern—strong in a world concord of nations."

"Not to keep Great Britain strong would be to abandon the continent of Europe to Russia. If that happens, the weight of Russia falls across Asia as well as Europe."

"We are dealing there with a strong people who have long been

repressed in many directions by the outside world," he said, "and who now, feeling themselves strong, are asserting themselves in unreasonable ways."

"I think we should be patient and fair with Russia—but firm," Landon asserted, "much more firm than we have been in standing for those principles and those international ideologies which—as far as we are concerned—were definitely involved in both World Wars. It is obvious as negotiations go on, adjustments be made. Adjustments on details, but not on principles."
