Col. H. C. Church, Son to Open Drug Store in Roseburg

Lt. Colonel H. C. Church, optometrist in Roseburg for 17 years prior to the recent war, announced today that in partnership with his son, Lt. Charles E. Church, he will install a drug store in the new annex now under construction at the Rose hotel. It is expected the business will open early in April.

Col. Church, a graduate of the school of pharmacy at N. Pacific college, Portland, served as a pharmacist at Portland and Aberdeen for several years, and was with Parke-Davis and Co. for three years, prior to engaging in optometry.

A veteran of the First World War, he held his optical business in Roseburg when called up from the Officers Reserve for service in the late war in December, 1940. He was assigned to the chemical warfare department of the Army and was stationed at several posts prior to assignment to Edgewood Arsenal. In his last assignment he traveled to all theaters of operation to study enemy methods and agents of chemical warfare.

His son, Lt. Charles E. "Chub" Church, who will be associated with him in the business, was a student at University of Oregon, having completed two years of premedics prior to enlisting in the Navy. He was trained in Naval aviation at Corpus Christi, Texas, and was then transferred to the Marines and completed his training at Cherry Point, N. C. He was assigned to duty as a transport pilot and participated in invasions of Okinawa, Iwo Jima and Saipan and also flew transport planes in Japan and China.

Colonel Church returned to Roseburg Friday and will be on terminal leave until April 26. Lt. Church is still in service, now located at the Marine base in Klamath Falls, but anticipates release on terminal leave in the near future. Following his release Lt. Church will enter the School of Pharmacy at Oregon State College to complete his education. A long-term lease has been obtained on quarters in the Rose Hotel annex, and furnishings, equipment and stock for a thoroughly modern drug store have been ordered and will be installed as soon as the building is ready for occupancy, Colonel Church reports.
