And so on, for nine terrible days. The ship's doctors attribute the high incidence of seasickness to nervous strain, reaction to the emotions of fear, apprehension and high excitement that beset women who were leaving their homes to go to a new and unfamiliar country.

It isn't a wholly new story to us. Two centuries ago English brides-to-be crossed the stormy Atlantic to become wives and mothers in this new country.

They are taking a long chance—risking everything in the hope of winning something better. The penalties for failing to make a go of it will be terrific.

But, after all, willingness to take a chance lies at the root of American achievement. "Nothing risked, nothing gained" is the first rule of the American way of life.

That is why the American way has outdistanced all other ways.

Here is a thought at this moment when the great promise of America's future seems to be caught in a log jam of doubt and fear and uncertainty:

On our industrial front, with a big investment at stake that must be repaid before profit is possible, management hesitates and fears to go ahead.

The decision to "go ahead and damn the torpedoes" would be a big gamble—but a gamble in the best American tradition. If it is taken, and WORKS, America will be off again to new heights of achievement.

THESE English brides can face it, management and labor in America ought to be willing to. It has worked before. It can work again.

GEN. BRADLEY'S DILEMMA

Admittedly ignorant of underlying facts and relying entirely upon what we read in the papers, we believe the American Legion should make a very thorough investigation into the action of its national commander in bringing charges against General Omar N. Bradley, veterans administrator.

The American Legion throughout many years has been critical of the Veterans Administration. But its criticism, for the most part, has been of a constructive nature.

But in this particular instance General Bradley has been on the job less than six months. Since he assumed the position of administrator, the number of veterans enrolled has doubled and now is near the 14 million mark.

The job of administrator of veterans affairs is no bed of roses. The political pressure is terrific.

A good many Roseburg residents can well remember the campaign which marked our own efforts to secure our present hospital. They can remember the hatred engendered by Eugene's interference.

In a recent issue of the Medford Mail Tribune, Herb Gray is aroused because the Army hospital at Camp White, with capacity for 2300 patients, is being abandoned.

We are expecting an equally plausible statement from Medford to appear in answer in the Klamath Falls Herald and News.

You may be certain that both Klamath Falls and Medford are putting plenty of pressure on the Veterans Administration and General Bradley.

Of course, here in Roseburg, we can't understand why the Veterans Administration should build facilities elsewhere in Southern Oregon, when there is already a fine hospital at Roseburg with ample ground for extensive additions.

It is entirely possible that every charge against the administrator of veterans affairs is borne out by fact, but the American Legion should ascertain positively that the tempest aroused by its commander is not simply because a proposed hospital is to be located on the wrong side of the tracks.

Missioner, Once Prisoner of Japs, Will Speak Here

The appearance of the Rev. Herbert James Riley, above, missionary of the Methodist church, recently returned from the Philippines, as guest speaker at a Missionary rally in the Methodist church here, Sunday, February 10, at 3 P. M. was announced today by Rev. W. A. MacArthur, local pastor.

Mr. Riley returned to the United States in the spring of 1945, after being released from the Santo Tomas prison camp on Luzon Island, where he had been interned for three years as a prisoner of the Japanese.

During his seventeen years as a missionary among students and young people in the Philippines, Mr. Riley recruited large numbers of the most promising young people of the archipelago as members of the church.

Mr. Riley is a native of San Jose, California and received his education at the College of the Pacific and at the University of Southern California. He is in the United States on furlough for a few months, and expects to return to the islands in the near future.

13 New Bridges To be Constructed in Umpqua Forest

Twelve new automobile bridges, one new horse bridge, and overhaul of two existing horse bridges, at a total expenditure of approximately \$31,000, are planned for the Umpqua National Forest during the coming year.

In the South Umpqua Ranger District, a bridge over Elk Creek, near Drew, Ore., is planned. A horse bridge over the South Umpqua River near Coffee Pot Camp, and a new tower for a swinging bridge over the South Umpqua near Jackson Creek, are also planned.

In the North Umpqua District, bridges are planned for Sitwah Creek on the Steamboat Road, and Dry Creek near Illahed Camp. Steamboat Creek Bridge, washed out recently as result of heavy rains and high water, will be replaced by another temporary span.

In the Bohemia District, east of Cottage Grove, bridge replacement is planned for Crawfish Creek, Flatview Creek, Herman Creek, Hobo Creek and the Upper Twin Bridges.
