NOTED PIANIST AVOIDS SPECIALIZATION IN APPROACH TO MUSIC

Dalles Frantz, brilliant young American pianist, who will be heard by the Roseburg Community Concert Association at 8:15 o'clock Thursday evening, February 7, at the Junior High School auditorium, is an all-out opponent of the rubber stamp approach.

A bold individualist, in his art and life, he abhors any cut-and-dried classifications that limit breadth and expanse and any labels that tend to cramp an artist into a narrow mold.

Although Dalles Frantz realizes that the public generally feels more comfortable when an artist's ability is neatly confined to a specialized field where he can do no wrong, he prefers to be free of a label. He wants his scope to remain unhampered and his fingers unfettered by public expectation.

"I don't want to be a far of musical jelly catalogued with a label," he says. "I don't think it's good to be dubbed a 'specialist.' Just because a man plays a Chopin composition unusually well, he comes to be typed 'Chopin player.' He may play other composers equally well, but once that happens, he has an uphill fight to prove it."

Frantz' own approach to the keyboard is, accordingly, manifold. He is not interested in having a style; he is interested in having many styles, interpreting a variety of music. He is concerned with the tendency to identify him with Liszt, whose works he performs magnificently and whom he resembles in his

good looks, personality and brilliant technique.

Frantz is interested in being able to interpret many composers, not one. He thinks his way and feels his way through to the spirit at the core of each work he plays and wants his performance to be as close as possible to the composer's personality as it is translated into the music.

This is immediately apparent at his concerts. One discerns at once Frantz' intense absorption in each of the brilliantly assorted compositions he performs. Audiences are fired by watching and hearing this handsome blond pianist launch into an interpretation with no sense of limitations and completely free of stylized mannerisms that would blur the overall effect.

Frantz wishes to bring to his audiences the best there is in classic and romantic, old and contemporary music. He says candidly, "a varied program is much more stimulating. After all, no meal should consist entirely of roast beef!"

Instructions Relative to Personal Property Assessment

EXPIRATION DATE MARCH 1, 1946

Extension of time will not be granted this year.

\$10.00 PER DAY PENALTY

For each day of the continuance of refusal or neglect to file return. PRIVATELY OWNED IMPROVEMENTS ON PUBLIC LANDS: Any privately owned structure or improvement on land owned by the United States is personal property and should be reported as such.

Privately owned improvements situated on land owned by the state or by a county, city or other municipal corporation are real property and should be listed as such.

Give the legal subdivision, section, township and range, on which improvements are situated; also, the year of construction and the total cost and the true cash value as of January 1 of the current year.

MERCHANDISE AND STOCK IN TRADE: The amount listed should agree with the inventory as shown by the books, including shipping and other charges. Take no discount or other deduction.

FIXTURES, FURNITURE AND EQUIPMENT IN BUSINESS OR COMMERCIAL USE: The true cash value of all furniture and equipment in auto courts, apartments, hotels, offices, and that part of household furniture and equipment used for commercial purposes in rented rooms, etc., should be listed.

The value given should correspond to the cost of replacing with like furniture and equipment (not new), rather than the amount which might be realized from a forced sale.

Household furniture, domestic fixtures, household goods and effects, actually in use as such in homes and dwellings, where not used for business or commercial purposes, are exempt from taxation and should not be reported on this form. Exemption also applies to wearing apparel, watches, jewelry, and similar personal effects actually in use.

The assessor shall cause blank forms for such returns to be prepared and distributed, but failure to receive or secure the form shall not relieve any such person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any returns herein required.

LIVESTOCK: Horses, cattle, sheep, goats, hogs, etc. Also poultry, chickens, ducks, turkeys and geese should be listed.

Space is also provided on the form for fur bearing animals, rabbits and bees.

All farm implements and machinery, all industrial equipment—sawmill, logging and mining equipment, etc.

Garage and service station equipment, pumps, tanks, oil storage containers, etc.

Motorized equipment not licensed with the state. Boats, vessels, and other watercraft, outboard motors.
