

City Department Officers Submit Monthly Reports

Monthly reports were submitted to the City Council Monday by heads of city departments. The reports and fire chiefs, the city treasurer, and the dog control officer. The council also approved payment of bills for services rendered the city.

Douglas J. Tudor, dog control officer, reported that during January, 14 dogs had been impounded; three dogs were claimed; five dogs were disposed of, and \$5 in impounding fees were collected.

Chief of Police Erwin Short reported the following arrests: eight for drunkenness; two for disorderly conduct; one for breaking into and entering private property, and one mental case. Short also reported that during January, 20 meals for prisoners were served, 106 traffic tickets were issued, 25 auto wrecks were investigated and 29 other investigations were made. Of three investigations of cases where breaking into and entering private property occurred, two of the investigations resulted in arrests, thus clearing the cases.

Funds collected by City Treasurer T. J. Brown were reported as follows: From taxes, \$14,861.06; from fines, \$256.00; from licenses, \$527.60; from sundries, \$1,433.50, for a total of \$17,078.16. The recreation fund received \$2,250.

Fire Chief Glenn H. Taylor reported that fire fighting equipment had been in use one-and-a-half hours during January to answer three alarms. Value of property at risk by fire was \$30,000 and actual known loss amounted to \$750. Fires were in two private dwellings and in one business establishment. Value of the dwellings was \$10,000 and of the business house, \$20,000. Causes of the fires were due to: One, defective wiring, damage \$750 to a house valued at \$3,000; one, petroleum or gas, actual damage not known; a third, an overheated flue, damage not known. Taylor also reported 14 inspections made, and 17 fire permits granted.

Exhaustion of Welfare Funds Looms in Polk

DALLAS, Ore., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Polk county's public welfare commission reported today that it would run out of welfare funds before the 1946 fiscal year ends. Chairman Walter Williams said the present backlog would stretch

through February, March, and possibly part of April. After that, they will need \$16,000 more to continue payments.

The situation duplicates that of several other Oregon counties, who have reported themselves unable to meet rising relief needs.

Diamond Lake Snow Is Reported

Latest reports of snow conditions at Diamond Lake indicate an average depth of 80.7 inches of snow—or six feet, nine inches—V. V. Harpham, supervisor of Umpqua National Forest, said yesterday. The reports were sent here by John Holst, caretaker at Diamond Lake resort.

Holst measured the depth of the snow at 12 locations near the lake. Deepest point was seven feet, three inches, Harpham said. Average water content is 26.1 inches, which means, he said "over two feet of water" is spread over the ground there. Average density (water content) of the snow is 32.3 per cent. This is the greatest water of the snow in more than 10 years, Harpham said.

A snow report from another part of the Umpqua National Forest, indicates 97 inches of snow at Champion Mines, near Fairview Lookout, in the Bohemia Ranger District, east of Cottage Grove.

Snow Falling on Roads in Higher Elevations

SALEM, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Snow was falling today on the mountain passes and over most of Eastern Oregon, the State Highway Commission reported today.

The daily road report included: Siskiyou summit—Two inches new snow, packed snow and ice from Milepost 329 (5 miles south of Ashland) south.

Green Springs Highway—6 inches new snow, still snowing, 22 degrees.

Coquille—South wind, roads bare.

Seattle Milk Producers Granted Price Increase

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Milk producers of the Seattle area have been granted an increase of 45 cents a hundred pounds for their milk by the OPA. The price to consumers in Seattle will be increased one-half cent a quart and to outside the city one cent.

Milk producers in the Seattle area had asked for an increase of 70 cents a hundred pounds. They had threatened to strike if it was not granted.

Welding Clinic Set at Farm Bureau Exchange

A. J. Townsend, manager of the Douglas County Farm Bureau Exchange, announced today a free farm welding clinic to be held at the cooperative plant, Washington and Spruce Streets, Friday, Feb. 8. The clinic, Townsend reports, will be in the nature of a practical demonstration in which broken gears and pieces of farm machinery will be welded under field conditions. Purpose of the clinic, he reports, is to demonstrate the Marquette Farm

Welder, for which the Exchange is agent, the machine being designed for a welding range from 20 to 180 amps. and constructed for R. E. A. requirements.

The regular Thursday clinic in the office of Dr. E. J. Wainscott, county health officer, will not be held tomorrow, because Dr. Wainscott will be attending the meetings in Portland tomorrow and Friday of the County Health Officers and Sanitarians, and of the Social Hygiene Institute.
