Vancouver Soldier Slain After Tavern Argument

VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 7. (AP)—A tavern argument ending in a street shooting was fatal last night for a soldier tentatively identified as Leo J. Sajdak, Vancouver Army barracks, Sheriff E. R. Brady said today.

The sheriff reported Edwin M. Higdon, 34, Vancouver, was being held on an open charge. He said witnesses seized Higdon as he fled from the doorway where the soldier's body was found with a bullet near his heart.

He said a revolver was found in Higdon's coat pocket. The shooting occurred about a block from the police station.

associations, stating that the Willamette Valley is an affiliate of the West Coast and handles all local lumber problems such as legislative, rail rates and other problems peculiar to this region and which the larger trade association can not handle.

Floyd Cook, field representative of the highway advisory committee, told of his work with state departments, primarily the state highway department where he acts as trouble shooter for the loggers and industry. He called upon local mill men to give top priority to the highway commission which is in need of timber and lumber to repair bridges damaged in the New Year's flood, as a means of establishing good relations with this state organization.

Russia Desires World Peace, Molotov Insists

LONDON, Feb. 7. (AP)—Russia's desire to "work in harmony with big and small peace-loving countries" in the interests of universal peace was voiced by Soviet Foreign Commissar Molotov in a speech quoted by the Moscow radio last night.

"There are no militant adventurous groups in the Soviet Union as is the case among the ruling classes in some other countries

in which insatiable imperialists already are encouraging rather dangerous prattle about 'the third world war,'" Molotov declared.
