

AAA Boards In Oregon Counties Pick Practices

Oregon county AAA committees now are selecting the practices to be offered in 1946 for assisting farmers in each county with soil and water conservation work, reports R. E. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee. This local control is designed to give the best adapted program for each county.

From the state handbook of 36 practices, committees are picking the projects which will contribute the most toward conservation in each county. County allocations of funds again will limit the amount of assistance available to farmers in each county for carrying out approved practices.

Six new practices are included in the state list for 1946. Two green manure practices have been added—summer grown legumes turned under in the fall, and red and alsike clover green manure. Another new practice provided for hauling on and spreading straw to prevent wind erosion. Establishing a stand of perennial bromegrass on steep slopes subject to erosion also will qualify for payment for the first time this year. Planting forest trees and clearing land for pasture are other additions to the 1946 handbook.

Former Practices Dropped

Practices offered last year which have been dropped for 1946 include destruction of plants on grazing land, pasture improvement, mowing weeds in pastures, rodent control, fire breaks, renovation of native hay meadows, and clearing land for tillage.

Payment rates and specifications have been changed for some of the old practices continued in 1946, but for the most part the program is substantially the same, Taylor said. County handbooks will be mailed to all farm-

CIO Convention Site Poses Tough Oregon Problem

The crowded condition of cities in Western Oregon creates a problem in finding a suitable location for a convention, reports Stanley Earle, executive secretary of the Oregon State CIO Council. Earle and A. F. Hartung, Oregon regional director of the CIO, were visitors in Roseburg yesterday, contacting local labor leaders.

The CIO, Earle said, will hold its annual convention in October, but to date has not chosen a site for the state meeting because of the difficulty in securing hotel accommodations.

Earle and Hartung were to be speakers in Sutherlin last night at a meeting of Local 7-307, IWA-CIO. They were to discuss the employment problem and current legislation in Congress which they said would be of benefit to labor.

In Portland, where they make their headquarters, there are now 35,000 unemployed, including 15,000 recently discharged veterans. These statistics, they said, were based on U. S. Employment Service figures. The CIO Boilermakers Union, Earle said, had a peak membership of 84,000 during the

War: Its membership has now dwindled to 5,000.

"Re-employment is the No. 1 problem not only in Oregon, but nationally," Earle said.

Milk Price Hike Wouldn't Up Output, OPA Man Says

PORTLAND, Feb. 7.—(AP)—An increase in price of Grade A milk would not boost production in the Portland area, OPA Price Executive Andrew Trice declared today.

The Dairy Cooperative Association, which supplies 67 per cent of the Portland area fluid milk supply, had announced it would ask the price increase to avoid diversion of fluid milk to other uses.

The OPA official said any price boost to producers would mean a boost for consumers and suggested instead that "manufacturers milk prices should be brought back into line."

The purposes of the Red Cross First Aid training course includes: To prevent accidents, to train people to do the right thing at the right time, to prevent added injury or danger and to provide proper transportation if necessary.

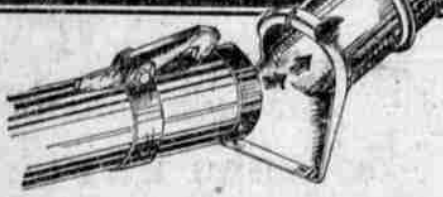

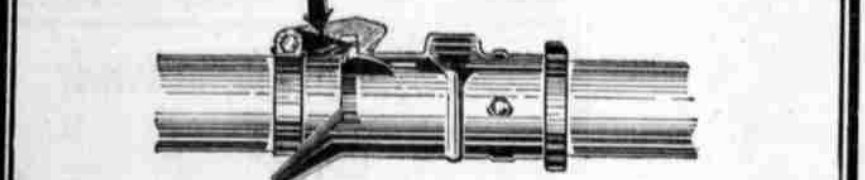
